MR. HARDY'S SLIPSHOD LEGISLA-TION.

Spalding's Regulation Mask, black enam-dying hours of the session. This bill was an amendment to the Loan Companies Act. Under the act of 1897 the registrar was merely a recording officer. The new act clothes this official with responsible judicial powers. He is vested with summary authority to suspend from doing business any loan company whose finances, bylaws, stock, securities, obligations or books are not satisfactory to him. And there is no appeal from his decision except to the Lieut.-Governor-in-Council. 'Any appeal to the ordinary courts is forbidden, and no claim for damages can be made against the Registrar, however foolish or malicious his decision may be, or however disastrous to

the company. Legislation along this line in Toronto at 15c, 25c, 50c, 75c, \$1, up to \$5 may perhaps have been advisable. May Prevent the Completion of the Railway Up the Jungfrau.

Zurich, April 6.-M. Guyer-Zeller, the Swiss railway king, originator of the latest project to carry a railway line t the summit of the Jungfrau and president the Jungfrau-Railway Company, died pneumonia Sunday at his home in Zurich.

May Not Be Completed.

May Not Be Completed. Berne, April 6.—It is believed in Berne that the death of M. Guyer-Zeller will cause serious complications in the affairs of the Jungfrau Railway, of which the de-ceased was concessionaire and promoter. M. Guyer-Zeller was the financial back-bone of the project to construct a tourist railway rising to an altitude of 12,670 feet bound terminating at the summit of the Jungfrau. Other financiers fought shy of the plan, which they regarded as chimerical, but it is not believed that the death of the president of the company will prevent the ultimate completion of the line.
