PARKIN SAILS FOR HOME

IS BRINGING GOOD NEWS

All the Provinces of Canada Will Share in the Rhodes Bequest.

London, Nov. 23.—Before sailing for New York on the Canada Line steamer Campania, from Liverpool yesterday, Dr. Parkin, who has been at Oxford for some time arranging for the admission to the university of the Cecil Rhodes scholars, said that probably 200 students would have residence at Oxford in 1904 under Mr. Rhodes' bequest.

He believed, he added, that all the provinces in Canada would eventually be included in the provisions of the bequest.

Emperor William, Dr. Parkin declared, was taking great interest in the matter, and had sent a special commission to Oxford, and representatives of the highest class of German students would shortly join the university.

Homes Under City Control Tax Churches to This End

Rev. Dr. Wild Endorses Aid, Graham's Scheme and Shows How Strong Can Bear Burdens of Weak—Rev. Dr. Milligan on Higher Criticism—in the Churches.

Some plain language was used by Rev. Dr. Wild, Bethel Church, Clinton, street, Sunday evening, when he spoke regarding municipal ownership of property for the poor. He wanted to see all the unsanitary shacks and tenements in Toronto as soon as possible. He endorsed Aid, Graham's scheme along those lines, and strongly urged that they be adopted without any delay. The little church was crowded to the doors, and at intervals the remarks of the preacher were applauded.

Dr. Wild retains much of the magnetism which drew thousands to his meetings every Sunday at Bond street Church many years ago, and the same earnestness characterizes his sermons. He had two texts last night. The first was Romans XV, "We will boast of ourselves, as we have been made perfect by the weakness of the weak." This was supplemented by a text from Galatians VI, "Bear ye one another's burdens, and so shall ye be perfect together."

Bear Burdens of the Weak. Dr. Wild said the strong ought to bear the burdens of the weak, but they didn't. It was the other way about, and the weak were compelled to bear the burdens of the strong. It would be to the benefit of the community at large. In that way alone sufficient money would be saved to meet the needs of the poor.

GANG PLANNED TO RAID JUNCTION CRAP-OUT

Failed to Fleece Gamblers With Crooked Dice and Shooting Affray Followed.

Toronto Junction, Nov. 23.—The hold-up on Friday night in the central portion of the town is the sole topic of conversation here. The general opinion is that it was a sequel to the crap game in the "joint" on Keeler-street, which has been in full swing for about three years. This "joint" has a very deserted appearance. Hundreds of people pass it nightly and never imagine that it is tenanted, yet it pays a rental of \$100 a month, and of light is frequented by many of Toronto Junction's well-known citizen and by gamblers from the city. A light is never seen there. The front door is locked. No one hangs around the outside, and the back can be reached either from a lane or from a large vacant lot to the south. The windows are padded and darkened, so that no light can be seen from the outside. It is here the crap game goes on, a very simple kind of game, which, if honestly played, would require little skill and be purely a game of chance.

Three sets of dice were found upon the man of multitudinous names who shot Charles Muthart on Friday night. At the preliminary trial on Saturday morning he did not plead or elect, and was remanded for further hearing till his next. The charge laid here is that of "shooting with intent to rob, doing grievous bodily harm." Michael Muthart, or Hugh Johnson, had another name when he came before the Magistrate. This time it was Hugh Johnson, a resident of Parkdale. His real name is Henry Bremner. He first told the magistrate that he was an American and afterwards that he was a Canadian.

Plan to Fleece Gamblers. Bremner has a little talkative about his cooling off in the cells, and what he says goes to show that a quartet of gamblers had decided to fleece the frequenters of crap joints by means of loaded dice. Filling in this, the four would fall upon the winners after the game and hold them up for their booty. He and three others entered upon a scheme on Friday night, and the plan was to use loaded dice. The fray which shocked the town. One of the quietest was the man who ran away. This man, Bremner says, was the leader of the party, and on the night of the shooting he was in the street as the game was going on around 10 o'clock.

Didn't Have the Nerve. Bremner went up, but when he got around the table he hadn't nerve enough to use the crooked dice, and after playing some time, came down stairs and told his pal the poor results of his venture. The leader then said, "Give me your coat, muffer and cap, and I'll go on." Bremner says they exchanged their garments, but before his pal had gone upstairs two men came out from the crap joint and began to get the man with him. Bremner was a few yards away at that time, and shortly after joined his pal. The shooting took place soon afterwards, the result of which and the clever capture by Constable Harper have already been stated. The quartet had made plans for visiting "craps" at Niagara and other places, and apparently intended to put the plan into effect in Toronto and in Canadian cities, where the names of the gang are known to the police.

Conducted Game Here. Bremner lived at 290 Church-street, Toronto, since his arrival there from Chicago and other western cities about a month ago. He was believed to be an expert crap shooter, and it is said, conducted a game also on Church-street, where he was broken up by the police. As far as the police here and in Toronto are able to learn, he has no criminal record. Bremner brought with him to Toronto a young woman, whom he married in a Methodist Church in a western town. His wife, being a Roman Catholic, expressed a desire to be married again in a Catholic Church, and arrangements were made with a Toronto priest to perform the ceremony. The bans were published for the first time a week ago to-day. Detectives Cuddy and Black had talk with Mrs. Bremner to-day, but she could tell nothing about her husband's accomplices in the hold-up, although she believed them to be from Toronto.
