full. Many were overtaxed. The horses were a splendid lot, and, what is more, they were mostly the property of the farmers of West Middlesex. In the sheep, there was a record number of entries, while in ladies' work and the fine arts, there was a bigger display than usual. Fruit was extra good. Of the Strathroy fair it can invariably be said that it has the finest exhibition of ladies' work to be found at any exhibition outside of Toronto. The ladies of the western section of the county appear to take a special pride in fancywork, and some of the articles that are to be seen at Strathroy year by year are decidedly creditable to them.

For some reason unknown, the number of entries in the poultry department this year showed a slight falling off from a year ago, but the quality was up to the usual mark. usual mark.

Teh dairy exhibit was one of the features of the fair this year. The judge was Mr. George Barr, secretary of the Western Ontario Dairymen's Association, London, and he took occasion to compliment the directors on the extent and quality of the display.
