DESPITE HOUSING SHORTAGE ADD HIGH COST OF LIVING WEDDINGS BREAK RECORDS

Are Girls Getting Back To Sensible Attitude of Their Grandmothers and Cutting Out Demands for Luxuries?—Pastors Are Kept Busy Tying Nuptial Knots.

Dan Cupid has established himself as the supreme optimist of the universe. Even the formidable old High Cost of Living has been unable to frighten him. He has gone right ahead with his little bow and arrow, and this year, in spite of the housing shortage and the immense increase in the cost of all commodities, he is inducing more young people than ever to launch out on the great sea of matrimony. This is borne out by the official figures, on record at the city hall.

Away back in 1914, when one had to spell out H. C. of L. that anybody would know what you meant, Cupid was working overtime in order to make any sort of a showing to his landlords at that time were falling over themselves to offer rose-covered, honeymoon bungalows for \$5 a month. These cottages could be furnished from attic to cellar for a couple of hundred dollars and as for daily maintenance, the young ladies reached the dizzy heights of fifty cents a pound, and eggs, occasionally, climbed to the same level. Milk was seven cents a quart and there was a clothing allowance needed to be only as large as the pin money of the present time. Yet in spite of all these obvious advantages only 605 young couples dared to set out on this rose-strewn path.

Keep Ministers Busy.
This year, when the housing shortage is so acute that many people are glad to own a small-sized tent by the river bank and when the board of commerce has finally decided to limit the price of sugar to 26 cents a pound, the prospects are that the license bureaus and the ministers will be as busy as they will not have time to attend properly to their ordinary duties. Already 388 pairs of venturesome young people have been duly and solemnly united in the bonds of a holy matrimony, an indication that the total number of marriages for the year will be in the neighborhood of 800.

There has been a constant variation in the number of weddings since 1914. The number in that year was 605, of which

75 were performed in June. In the following year a total of 707 was reached 71 taking place in June. In 1916 the total fell to 656, and the favorable bride month saw only 43 weddings. The slump continued, so that the total dropped to 463 in 1917. June was a little more popular than the rest of the month being 54. The next year, when the real serious advance in the cost of living began to take place, seemed to set the young people of the city in a mood to defy the discouraging conditions, and 549 couples took the marriage vows, 59 of them in June. Last year, in spite of increasingly unfavorable living conditions, the number of weddings broke records.

Are Women Changing?
Various reasons for the daring spirit which is leading such a great number of young couples to face the troubles of life during the present stress of the period are advanced by the love statisticians. Some of them say that it is the young ladies of the period who are returning to the sensible attitude which their grandmothers held toward life. A return to the old-time hearth and home is being demanded to start life in as favorable circumstances as their parents had reached after years of struggle. Now they are willing to face the future with nothing more than the assurance that their young husbands love them and can earn a sufficient weekly wage to keep a humble roof over their heads.

This attitude is to be seen even in the courtship period. The 1914 damsels demanded huge boxes of chocolates, expensive bouquets of flowers, and the box seats for the opera to which they had to be taken in a taxi. Now anyone who would marry a girl today must be content to admire the beauties of the city parks as their principal entertainment, and to make love just adorably over a ten-cent bag of lollypops as their pre-wedding sisters did over the highest achievements of the candy-makers art.

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Great Britain Building More Ships Than U. S.

LONDON, July 21.—Total tonnage now under construction in the United Kingdom exceeds the amount under construction in the United States by 1,672,000 tons, according to the register of shipping. The aggregate amount now under construction in Great Britain is 3,578,000 tons—the highest amount ever recorded.

Such comment has been aroused in shipping circles by these figures, says the London Times. But, it adds, the fallacy of the United States to maintain its lead in shipbuilding was expected, since the intensive construction there was chiefly a war measure.

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REJECTION OF WAGE OFFER WOULD MEAN TIE-UP IN DOMINION

Canadian Railwaymen Look For Better Offer Than U. S. Board Awarded.

MAJORITY DISPLEASED
Fourteen Groups On Canadian Lines To Be Considered.

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Toronto, July 21.—On the basis of the understanding that Canadian railway workers will be awarded increases in pay on the same basis as announced yesterday for the employees of the United States roads, leaders of the Canadian railway brotherhoods in this city do not regard the proposed increase as at all satisfactory, or as likely to meet the demands of the men. It is freely stated by some that there must be a general strike on the Canadian railways if the increases to be granted here are not more generous than those announced for the United States fellow-workers. There are fourteen groups of organized railway workers on the Canadian roads, and according to the railway executives here, it will be hard to satisfy them all. At the hearing of the present case of the Canadian National Railways it is estimated that increases on the scale granted in the United States would mean a jump from \$78,000,000 to \$92,000,000 in the payroll of that system, which now includes, of course, the Grand Trunk.

The Canadian Pacific payroll would also show a heavy increase.

Thousands of Poles
Rushing to Defence
of Their Country

Half a Million Have Returned To Call To Colors.

WARSAW IS EXCITED
Poland Threatened by Invasion From Russian Reds.

Warsaw, July 21.—(By the Associated Press).—It is estimated that more than a half million returned to the call of arms in Poland. The war spirit is dominating Warsaw newspapers. The people generally believe that an armistice would not necessarily mean peace.

Processions of short-toussured students and uniformed recruits today marched beside clerics and middle-aged men from the shops and fields. Polish police were on duty today in the streets. A procession was planned for this afternoon to demonstrate in education in the United States consulate, and fears were expressed of attacks on trains.

The Liberty Hall citizen army, it is declared, is talking sides against the moderate chiefs of the organization.

More police were on duty today than had been seen for months, and it was believed in many quarters that ugly scenes were to be expected.
