WARD 4 CONSERVATIVES HEARD GREAT SPEECHES

Annual Banquet Addressed by Members of Federal and Local Houses.

It was 11:45 on Saturday night at the Fourth Ward Conservative banquet in Victoria Hall when the last toast was given and the last bunch of speakers was called upon.

It did not leave much time for oratory without violating the Lord's Day Act, but some of the speakers had already gone home and Dr. Nesbitt got the first chance, and his 3-minute speech was one of the briskest oratorical efforts that have been listened to lately.

That day's Globe editorial, "Do It Now" was in line with other attacks recently made upon Premier Whitney. It came immediately after Mr. Whitney's speech, when he had just finished a contract had been made with William Mackenzie or was contemplated.

He wanted to say a word in praise of Hon. Adam Beck. (Applause.) He stated that when the power question was settled Mr. Whitney would give people their own power. The idea that Mr. Whitney was going to make bargains with Wm. Mackenzie or anyone else. The people wanted their own power, with J. F. Whitney as their champion, and not Wm. Mackenzie. (Applause.)

He was not looking for office, but was out to see the people every day of his life. He would recommend the Conservative electors to read the Globe every day, and everything that he said there not to do it. George Foster was the man above all others the government dreaded, and he was the man who had stripped them of their hides and showed them in their true character. (Applause.)

Mr. W. Burns was in the chair, and among others at the guest table were Hon. George Foster, Hon. J. F. Whitney, Hon. Dr. Pyne, Edmund Bristol, M.P.; Claude Macdonell, M.P.; W. K. McNaught, M.L.A.; A. E. Donovan, M.L.A.; and Dr. Brunel. Mr. Burns set the speaking machine going with the usual toasts. He gave the power question the importance of importance in speaking of the government policy, but Dr. Nesbitt was the only speaker to mention it. Besides, Fred Dana assumed the role of a prophet, and looked forward to the attendance of cabinet ministers from the Dominion Government at the next Fourth Ward banquet.

Hon. George Foster complimented his comrades at Ottawa. Not one of the four-score was to be preferred to another. Each had his own peculiar work, and they had a general—(applause)—who contributed to the general result. To his colleagues in Toronto he paid tribute. For the member for North Toronto he referred them to The Globe, where they would find party English as she is spoke. (Laughter.) The country had not been slow in response to the fight the opposition had been making at Ottawa, British Columbia, Nova Scotia, Briceville and London, in Ontario, and New Brunswick testified to the change of opinion. They had spent two weeks at Ottawa before they were convinced that the people were against them, and that the opposition was strong enough to enforce the principle they supported. He found a disposition in some quarters to criticize the alleged obstruction of the opposition, and he explained the constitutional principles upon which it was based. He assured them that they would hear more from parliament than they had heard yet. (Cheers.) A more extravagant, more unworthy and more recklessly shameless government had never existed since Confederation. If any measures could be taken by the opposition to punish those who fraudulently obtained grants of land or to restore such lands to the people, those steps would be taken.

Claude Macdonell spoke of the persistent efforts in season and out of season by which the Liberal government had compelled the government to sign a contract of Saturday for the improvement of Toronto Harbour. The obvious Hamilton radical bill had only gone thru with amendments required by the city, and general legislation was to be passed in the Railway Act covering all the points involved for the benefit of other municipalities. Warren Hastings had never robbed and had not been present government had rided the empire of the west. Premier Roblin had declared that not one Liberal member would be returned by his great province.

The Local Members. Hon. J. J. Foy replied to the toast of the legislature. He was cordial in his compliments and references, but contented himself with allusion to Premier Whitney's recent speech and a good story to round out his remarks. Hon. Dr. Pyne regretted the responsibility of office that prevented an unconsidered address on such a festive occasion. The school text book policy of Premier Whitney had cut a great figure in the recent election. New Brunswick and brought thousands of votes to Mr. Hazen. Mr. Donovan spoke at some length, and introduced vocal interludes in his remarks on the committee, of which Harry Saunders was an energetic chairman, and he was congratulated on the success of the evening. The toast of "Our Guest" followed and the proceedings terminated just before midnight.
