Official Wants Him Removed Because He Has Demoralized the Rest of the Inmates.

ALBANY, N.Y., Sept.1.-A protest is nade in a report submitted to the state commission of prisons to-day by County jail at Poughkeepsie of Harry K. Thaw, acquitted on the charge of murder on the ground of insanity.

Mr. McLaughlin's report says, among other things, that Thaw's presence in the jail "demoralizes the discipline of the institution."

After calling attention to the presence of Thaw in the jail, the report says in part:

"He has been held in this jail for several months pending the outcome of litigation, which looks now as tho it might be interminable. His presence in this jail is embarrassing to the sheriff and objectionable on many accounts. The sheriff has no room for him except in the padded cell; even this he needs for temporary use, and it would be an entirely unfit place in which to confine a man for months.

Must Be Isolated.

"Having been adjudged insane with homicidal tendencies, the sheriff would not be justified in confining him with the other prisoners. He cannot keep him in the quarters intended for boys. To do so would compel him to keep the boys with the adult prisoners, which the law forbids. "All these things are under the observation of the other prisoners and create dissatisfaction, a belief that class, even in prison.

"These things produce an ugly feeling of discontent and rebellion among the other prisoners."
