N. TORONTO COUNCIL MEETS TUESDAY NIGHT

Who Will Be Chairmen of Committees?—County News Gathered Over Wide Area.

NORTH TORONTO, Jan. 4.—(Special.)—The opening of the new continuation school, inaugurated by George H. Reed, late principal of Markham High School, and which will be temporarily located in the top flight of the Eglington town hall, took place this morning. There was a small attendance, only five pupils appearing, but many a successful educational institution in Ontario to-day began from similarly small beginnings. North Toronto is admirably adapted for the successful building up of a splendid collegiate institute, and if the presence of a principal who is at once enthusiastic and endowed with exceptional ability can make the venture a success, Geo. H. Reed is the one man admirably adapted for the position. Markham High School is a standing tribute to the energy and ability of George H. Reed.

The town council will meet for the first time on Tuesday evening for the despatch of business, when the several committees will in all probability be chosen. For the board of works there is no other name suggested than that of Councillor Murphy, who has discharged the duties of this office for the last three or four years.

Councillor Frank Howe will undoubtedly continue as supervisor of the parallel roads committee, to which he has already given infinite thought and care, and as for the finance, assessment and executive committee, Councillor Lawrence will doubtless be called to preside.

On the water, fire and light committee, Councillors Peers or Councillor Walter Mutton may be the choice. In St. Cuthbert's (Leaside) Mission on Thursday evening, the annual Christmas entertainment will be held at 8 o'clock sharp. The program is being prepared and as St. Cuthbert's social fetes are always most enjoyable events, a good big rally is expected. There is a general interest in week of prayer being conducted in Davisville Methodist Church, and the inaugural meeting of which was held on Monday evening. The services will continue until and including Friday night.

EAST TORONTO.

Local Men Will Try and Keep Y.M.C.A. Open.

EAST TORONTO, Jan. 4.—A meeting will be held next Thursday night at the East Toronto Y. M. C. A. hall by the business men of the town, when committees will be formed for the purpose of finding out whether or not some effort may be made to have the Y.M.C.A. building kept open.

193 BARS ARE CLOSED BY LOCAL OPTION VOTE

And There Would Have Been 300 More Had It Not Been For Three-Fifths Clause.

WEST TORONTO, Jan. 4.—The members of the Dominion Alliance has polled a majority in favor of local option in 124 towns and townships, while the license forces won 17.

But of those won by the alliance, 54 are lost owing to the three-fifths vote clause. Twenty of the towns and townships which were voting on the question are yet to be heard from, but it is hoped by "the alliance" that at least half will result favorably.

In the seventeen places held by the alliance, by a straight majority there are 83 licenses, while in the 10 towns and districts won by the alliance, but which are lost by the three-fifths clause, there are 238 bars. In the places which gave more than the majority called for by the alliance, there are 193 bars. The people of Ontario, therefore, voted to close 431 bars, but 321 of these will remain open.

Even had the gain a substantial one, and on May 1 there will be fewer bars open in Ontario than ever before in its history, not excepting the period when the liquor traffic was in force in the greater part of the province.

"Yes, we are gratified at the results of the local option campaign," said Ben H. Spence, secretary of the alliance. "We most certainly beat the liquor men a great deal worse than last year, and if it had not been for the three-fifths clause we would have had almost a complete victory. One thing I know, that the liquor men are shouting for joy at being able to protect themselves by this means. A clause like this makes it almost impossible to make any headway. We give our whole time to the work, and all we receive is the news that many townships would have been dry had it not been for the three-fifths clause."

"Never in the history of the temperance movement has the injustice of this restriction been shown to such a great extent as this year. The larger towns and cities are practically shut out from the benefits of local option."

"There is no doubt but what the people of Ontario are in favor of local option," said President Jos. Gibson. "I believe that I can see the day when we will practically sweep Ontario with our policy. The last campaign has been a big success, and we are not a bit discouraged. I am sure that the next campaign will show even a greater success."

Galt licenseholders will ask for a recount, in an effort to upset the majority of 8.

Orangeville carried the bylaw by a majority of 280 votes. Stayner carried by a majority of 141 votes by three.

Dunwich Township carried by seven, and Leeds Township by 15. Blyth Village defeated it by three. Chapleau by three, and Keewatin by five on straight majority votes, while Bath defeated it by three due to the necessary three-fifths vote. Burlington by three, Dutton by three, Elora by two, Hespeler by six, and York by six.

Amherstburg voted to increase the cost of licenses to \$600.

RECOUNT IN BRANTFORD

Local Optionists Hope to Change Result of the Vote.

BRANTFORD, Jan. 4.—(Special.)—According to the local option advocates a change may be made in the result of yesterday's close vote, which failed by 55 votes, according to the official returns, to secure a three-fifths endorsement.

A recount of the ballots will be asked for. It is claimed that there were a large number of rejected ballots, upon which was printed a cross line. In numerous instances the cross line was in the outside of the line, and these were rejected. The hotel interests are confident that the recount will help them to carry the vote.
