

PREPARE ESTIMATES FOR PUBLIC WORKS

Total of \$21,000,000 Announced—Includes Money for Toronto Harbor.

Ottawa, Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Public works estimates to a total of approximately \$21,000,000 have been prepared for submission to parliament to cover expenditures for the coming fiscal year. These estimates include both maintenance and new works, and, for the greater part, are simply revotes of appropriations already approved. All works now in progress are to be continued, and the estimates include the work at Courtney Bay, St. John; the breakwater at Toronto, a wharf at Port Arthur, a drydock at Beumin, and another at Vancouver, the contract for which is still being held up and has not yet been awarded, chiefly for the reason that the public works department has lacked head for some time back. It has been generally supposed that public works expenditures were heavily curtailed during the war. A comparison, however, of the total expenditures on public works, under capital and consolidated expenditures during the five years from 1914-15 to 1918-19, inclusive, and for the five years preceding really tells a different story.

MANY HUNGARIANS IN RUSSIAN PRISONS

Budapest, Feb. 9.—Former Hungarian soldiers, who have returned to Hungary after escaping from Russian prisons in Siberia, state there are 200,000 Hungarian prisoners of war in that country and that their condition is pitiable. Some of them have been away from home for three to six years, and the Hungarian government is unable to find the \$5,000,000,000 crowns, which would be necessary to bring about their repatriation.

HALDANE EXPLAINS STATEMENT ON LABOR

London, Feb. 9.—Lord Haldane issues an explanation declaring his statement that the hope of the future lay with labor, had no reference to any particular election, but was directed to future policy generally. "If I were a Paisley elector," he states, "I should vote for Mr. Asquith, not merely because he has been my old friend and intimate friend, or even on account of the great and definite services he has rendered to the nation, but because I think at this time the interests of the state require the presence in the commons of a man whose commanding personality will enable him, not only to advise, but to influence the house in vital pressing issues."

MISSING IN SIBERIA

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 9.—Inquiries are being made as to the safety of H. R. Poussette, acting Canadian trade commissioner at Vladivostok, Siberia. With the recent advances of Bolshevik forces, there is naturally some apprehension. No official word has been received from Mr. Poussette for some time.

JAIL AND LASHES

KAISER'S HOLDINGS
IN NATURE OF MYTH

Government, After Search,
Finds Story of Possessions
in Canada a Mistake.

Ottawa, Feb. 9.—(By Canadian Press).—State department officials take issue with statements contained in a Toronto Globe editorial of Saturday last on "the Kaiser's political investments" in Alberta and British Columbia, where it was stated, some millions of dollars' worth of property were held by Alvo Von Alvensleben, afterwards rounded up as a spy. A high official of the department stated that the Canadian Press today that instead of Alvensleben having several million dollars' worth of property tied up ready to hand over to Wilhelm, the Canadian government had spent some thousands of dollars to learn that this and other similar stories were in the nature of myths. Alvensleben, it was said, had lost money in investments in the west, but it was found that his interests in timber and mineral rights and other properties were really so small that there was practically nothing for the government to seize. The Globe advocated that there should be no hesitation about confiscating these properties, which were in the nature of political investments made by Von Alvensleben on behalf of the Kaiser.

Timber Land Mythical

Alvensleben was reported to hold one block of timber land worth nine million dollars and also 14 other timber tracts on Vancouver Island. In addition to this there was a house and grounds at Kerrisdale for which he had refused \$150,000 before the pre-war financial stringency struck the west. This estate he was reported to be holding on in the country, and the Kaiser there when Germany had won the war and taken over Canada as a colony.

However, after spending considerable time and money in a search for something of Alvensleben's, which could be seized as enemy property, this official of the state department said that the officials would not be holding on to anything which would enable them to find something worth confiscating. In the opinion of officials here, Alvensleben was using the Kaiser's name to bolster up his own credit with the banks and other financial interests when he wanted to secure loans. If he came back and paid up what he owed, his property, it is stated, he would have little left from any source.

TERRORIST CAMPAIGN STARTS IN MADRID

Madrid, Feb. 9.—A terrorist campaign, similar to that in Barcelona, appears to have started in Madrid. Three unexploded bombs were found by the police Saturday.

Domino Sugar Co., Chatham, Resumes Refining Operations

Chatham, Ont., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—The Dominion Sugar Company resumed operations at its refining plant here today. Cargoes of raw sugar are arriving daily from the West Indies. It was planned to commence operations at the end of the year, but the company's plans were hindered on account of strikes in the United States. Four hundred men are being employed.

WANT TO BE DEPORTED

San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 9.—Resolutions, expressing the desire of 1000 Russians residing in San Francisco to be deported to soviet Russia were forwarded today to the state department, the immigration commissioner, and to Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, self-styled "soviet ambassador" to the United States.
