TO DYE BROWN.—For each pound of wool take a quarter pound of alum and two ounces of cream of tartar, and boil for half an hour. Take half a pound of red powder, quarter pound of fustic, and two ounces of logwood, soak these at night in sufficient warm water to cover the wool; take the wool out of the alum water and boil with the woods for about half an hour. If a dark brown is wanted add about a tablespoonful of copperas.
