ST. PIE.

Allow me a word for St. Pie and Abbottsford. This field is extending and becoming more and more important. What emigration had taken away from us is more than compensated by new additions of families, some of whom have recently come out of romanism. I am sorry that we have not a laborer to place there permanently. Our dear brother G., while doing his work, spends a good deal of his time visiting those families. What a rich nature, warm heart and so constant in his zeal for the cause of the Lord! In clusters I have often met in that neighborhood ten or twelve Catholics, heads of families. I trust the Lord will send a laborer for this locality!

SOUTH ELY.

This station was occupied during the summer months by Mr. Godfroi Massé, the present assistant teacher at Grande Ligne. The people of Ely were very importunate in requesting the Board to leave Mr. Massé there, but in spite of their persisting we could not see it our duty to leave him there while he was so much needed at Grande Ligne, where his natural ability and collegiate education so clearly designated him for that post. In order to satisfy in some measure the wish of the people of Ely, we have agreed that Mr. Massé would give them a Sunday each month, and that others would go as for as practicable also once a month, a fortnight later. We trust that a suitable laborer may soon be placed there permanently.

ST. CONSTANT, ST. MICHEL & NEIGHBORHOOD.

This large field where a good deal might be accomplished both by strengthening the somewhat isolated Protestant families and reaching Roman Catholic ones who are well disposed, will of necessity be neglected as long as we cannot place there a permanent laborer, which we very much regret. It has been a little better
