WOUNDED SOLDIERS

(Edmonton "Bulletin.")

Two theatres in Edmonton have taken the bull by the horns and offered to provide five or six wounded soldiers returned from the firing line with light employment by creating positions at salaries above the normal scale. The management of the Bijou and Empress photoplay houses are the first ones to come forward and voluntarily offer to make places for men whose names have been handed to them by John Blue, of the Patriotic Fund.

Starting next week, at least five and possibly six men who have recently been invalided home from the front will be installed as employes in these two theatres. Some of the positions will afford the candidates unusual opportunities for learning a useful trade while drawing ample living wages. For the more seriously wounded much lighter employment will be found.

"This is the least we can do for these men," says Manager Fiddes, of the Bijou. "Lucrative positions at good wages are hard to find right now, but the men who have returned to Edmonton in no condition to perform heavy manual tasks will be amply provided for. We have already made an opening for Pte. Dunn, of the Princess Pats, and Mr. Blue expects to give us the names of more men who have been incapacitated in the hard fighting in northern France."

"We are raising the wages for wounded soldiers to above the normal mark," says Manager Hazza of the Empress. "In two cases we are willing to pay 25 per cent. more than we would to civilians in similar positions."

EXPOSING A FALLACY

In an article by Comrade Lensch, in the Hamburger Echo, I read the following: "Whilst on the one side the flower of youth and, therefore, the future of the country is being sacrificed, in England among the widest circles of the nation one sees nothing of the war." As a Social Democrat and an opponent of war, I have no inclination to defend the British ruling classes. But one thing I would like to say. Whoever declares now that the British people see nothing of the war, or in any way stands aloof from it, shows that he has absolutely no notion of the true state of affairs. Almost in one night England has become a military state; the war has converted the professional army into a national army. It is a fact that all classes are bearing their part, and it is even probable that military necessity will make very little difference between the number of representatives from each class. It is true that those who rely for their knowledge of English conditions on certain London journals will be misled because in their zeal for compulsion these papers paint the situation as
