Empire Fighting For Existence; Men And Guns Ready--Lord Haldane

That the empire was fighting for existence but that men were rolling up in sufficient numbers, making conscription unnecessary, and that British gun-makers were turning out an arm equal, if not superior, to the German 42-centimetre monster were features in an address by Lord Haldane at the session of the House of Lords yesterday at which adjournment was taken until parliament re-assembles on Feb. 2.

Efforts of the opposition to learn the number of men recruiting were fruitless as Baron Lucas declared such information would be of great value to the enemy.

Reports of Italy and Roumania having decided to enter the war were the substance of the general news. The youngest son of Premier Viviani of France was killed in action at Cassini.

Confirmation of the sinking of the British steamer Charcas off the coast of Chili by the German converted cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich was brought to New York by Captain Norris and eight members of the crew of the Charcas, who were taken off the steamer by the Germans.

ITALIAN MEETS DEATH

Giacomo Foggioli, an Italian, 23 years of age, while employed yesterday on the Norton Griffiths works at Courtenay Bay was instantly killed by being struck by a huge crane. It swung upon him while his back was towards it. He apparently thinking himself out of reach of it. It locked him against an iron abutment, crushing his head and killing him in a few seconds. Coroner Roberts decided the death was accidental and that no inquest was necessary.

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FULL VIEW OF AERIAL BATTLE ON CHRISTMAS DAY

Atlantic Liner Minnehaha Directly Under Battering Aeroplanes Off Sheerness — Airmen's Awful Hazards

New York, Jan. 8.—Nine passengers and the crew of the Atlantic transport liner Minnehaha, here from England, are the first persons to reach this country who witnessed the German aeroplane raid which was aimed at London, but which was repulsed by British airmen on Christmas Day.

The Minnehaha lay directly beneath the fighting aircraft. There was a dense fog and the Minnehaha, which had left London on Christmas Eve, had been compelled to anchor near Sheerness. The passengers and crew were bored and grumbling, and there was little Christmas spirit aboard. But the blast of a bugle and an instant afterward the shrill scream of a warship, followed by the sound of guns.

Through the clearing mist, someone caught sight of a German aeroplane far overhead, and instantly every eye was turned toward it. Presently a second appeared out of the haze. They were travelling at great speed, headed toward London, and about them shells were hurrying like firework bombs. It seemed as though the aeroplanes would slip the range of the guns ashore, when suddenly three British aircraft darted in to view from the shelter of a heavy cloud bank.

They were swifter than the Germans and they raced after them, intent apparently, on climbing to higher altitudes, from which they could drop bombs on the enemy. The Germans saw them and circled. The British craft circled, too, and dodged this way and that, striving to get above the Germans and at the same time keep out of range of the British fire.

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
