**Dealers and Producers Make Year Contract—Price to Consumer Unchanged**

Though the time was short between the calling of the King's County milk strike yesterday morning and the settlement of it in the afternoon of the same day as stated in last evening's Times-Star, a stall of shipments that was felt somewhat throughout the day and again this morning was caused. The trouble having been adjusted ensures no further shortage and whatever stint felt was not general.

Tuesday night's shipments and a hurried supply from local resources saved the situation for the space of 24 hours according to J. T. Tiley of the Purity Ice Cream Company, in an interview with a Times-Star reporter this morning.

The settlement is that the dealers pay the producers 50 cents for ten eight-gallon cans, same as prevailed last year. The contract is made for a year. Prices to the consumer remain as now.
