MINISTERS CONFER ON ROAD PROBLEMS

Meeting at Halifax on Administration of N. B. and N. S. Highways

HALIFAX, Nov. 16.—Representatives of the governments of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia were in conference today in an endeavor to harmonize the administration of the highways in the two provinces. The conference was held in the office of Hon. P. C. Black, Minister of Highways for Nova Scotia.

Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, represented New Brunswick, and he was accompanied by George L. Ingraham, New Brunswick Inspector of motor vehicle licenses, and G. Earle Logan, secretary of the New Brunswick Board of Public Utilities. The conference will be continued this afternoon and tomorrow. The New Brunswick representatives will be taken on a tour of the highways of Nova Scotia.

World News In Short Metre

BATAVIA, Java—There were widespread Communist outbreaks over night in various parts of western Java. Several persons were killed and a number wounded. Minor damage was done to the railway and telegraph lines. The authorities promptly quelled the disturbance.

PARIS—Foreign Minister Vandervelde of Belgium has arrived in Paris and is conferring with the President of the Council of the League of Nations at Geneva in December. It is understood an agreement was reached.

LONDON—A cable message received here from Charlie Chaplin protests vehemently against the proposed release of a British film entitled "The Life Story of Charles Chaplin." "The film," he cabled, "is unauthorized and was made without my knowledge. I consider the private lives of artists are their individual property and should not be exploited by third parties."

FINE RADIO PROGRAM

Last night's radio program from one of the leading New York stations was of a particularly high order and inaugurating a new service being put on the air by the National Broadcasting Co., a corporation resulting upon a merger of several important concerns. The program consisted of grant operatic standard favorites by some of the greatest vocalists on the continent, a tabloid version of Gilbert and Sullivan's "H. M. S. Pinafore" rendered by American leading light opera stars, selections by the University of New York band, dialect sketches by Webster and Field themselves and a pot-pourri of other outstanding entertainment worthy of notable occasion. Reception of radio in Saint John was excellent and household folk sat up until well after midnight enjoying the remarkable program.

BELIEVED IT "FALMOUTH"

HALIFAX, Nov. 16.—Sunken at her anchorage, with about six and a half feet of water over her deck, an unknown schooner was sighted Sunday evening in latitude 43:30 north, longitude 60:40 west, a few miles south-west of Sable Island, by the French trawler Aste. Whether it is evidence of a new marine disaster or a relic of one of the wrecks which strew the bars to Sable Island, is a matter of conjecture. There is a strong probability that the submerged wreck is the Gloucester fisherman Falmouth, which burned and sank off the north-west bar of Sable Island this spring.

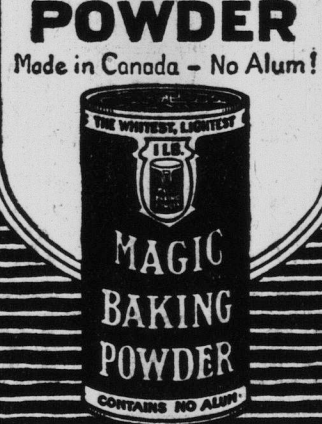

Further Increase For Income Tax Refund

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—Secretary Mellon yesterday again boosted the ante on the plan of President Coolidge for income tax credit, declaring it would be safe to permit taxpayers of saving of at least 15 per cent on their next year's income levies. The 15 per cent minimum credit was predicted, Mr. Mellon explained, on a prospective surplus of \$800,000,000 for this fiscal year. First estimates made by the president indicated a surplus of \$200,000,000 and on that ground he proposed a ten per cent credit which later was boosted to 12 1/2 per cent.

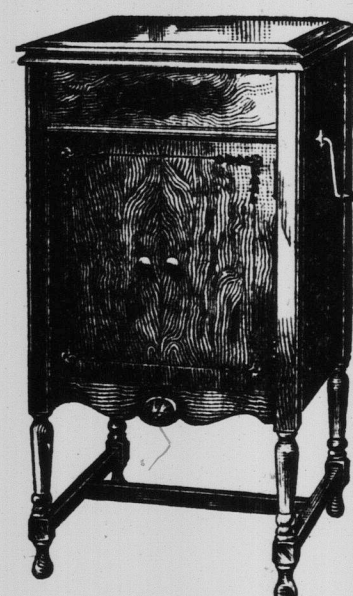

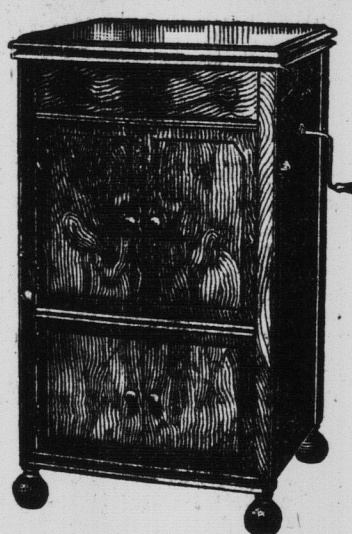

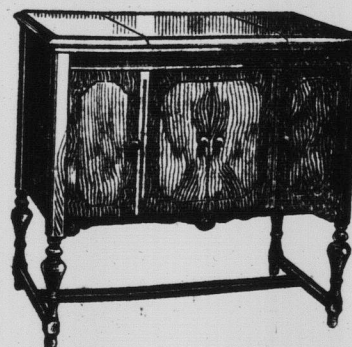
