

SERGEANTS HONOR FALLEN COMRADES

Wreath Placed on Civic War
Memorial Sunday Morn-
ing—Salute Given

A brief and simple ceremony at 11 o'clock when members of the Garrison Sergeants Mess placed a very beautiful wreath on the civic war memorial in King square in memory of their comrades of the First Canadian division who repelled the Germans in the gas attack at Ypres on April 22, 1915.

The members taking part were: R. G. M. S. C. Moore, M.M., representing the army; C. P. O. L. H. Thompson, of the R.C.N.V.R., representing the navy; and Sgt. E. C. Tremblay, who was in uniform and wearing medals and Pioneer Sgt. Robert Dickie (Pvt. Sgt.-Major W. E. Ross, president of the mess.

After placing the wreath, the president stepped back from the monument and stood for a few moments at the salute. The simple ceremony was a testimony to the effect that the Garrison Sergeants Mess had not forgotten those who made the supreme sacrifice.

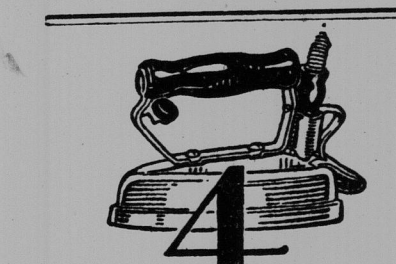

Artistic interpretation, controlled technique and good tone production were marked features in the excellent program of Schumann's music, put on by Miss Muriel McIntyre's piano pupils in the Georgian hall room of the Admiral Beatty Hotel, on Saturday afternoon.

The large number of music teachers, who were present and who expressed by their attention and hearty applause their approval of the method adopted by Miss McIntyre, was very gratifying to a young worker in the profession. The room was filled with parents, friends and music lovers generally.

Interpreted among the many numbers of short piano selections were sweet songs by Margaret Praeger, Purdy Gregg, Earle Fraser and Lola Vail, all from the works of Schumann. The violin duet by Claire and Franklin Hodgson was greatly enjoyed, as were the paper by Shuna Gilchrist, put on by Miss Muriel McIntyre's piano pupils in the Georgian hall room of the Admiral Beatty Hotel, on Saturday afternoon.

The exception of group one, the groups were not arranged according to grades, but according to the progress of the story brought out in the works, making the program uniform.

A pastel drawing of Robert Schumann, done by Ted Campbell, a pupil of the Saint John Art School, was highly commended for its delicate coloring and exact portraiture of the great master. It was set on an easel and was a fine addition to the pretty decoration of the platform.

Helen Morgan, a High School girl, Miss McIntyre's senior pupil, played all the accompaniments from memory and the Novelties in F, with finished touch and interpretation. The concert closed with the National Anthem, led by the children. Little Frances Mullin presided.
