CRIMINAL HOUSE BURNS ON DUE BEFORE DAWN

GOVERNMENT MAJORITY OF 3 IS PREDICTED

3 Progressives, Maybe 4, Expected to Oppose King DEBATE RESUMES

Vote on Report of Customs Probe Is Cause of Much Speculation OTTAWA, June 23.—Parliament will see before dawn what is considered the most crucial division of the present session. The vote on the Stevens amendment, which censures the government, may be reached before midnight. It is said that at least three Progressives will vote against the government and a fourth is supposed to be inclined to follow suit. Other members of the farmer's party have by no means made up their minds whether or not they will continue to support the government on a motion which calls for censure on the ground of mismanagement of the customs department. The vote arises out of the report of the customs probe committee. With one Progressive absent without leave and the speaker's vote eliminated, the prospects now are that the government will get a majority of three. GOVERNMENT'S HAZARD But it more than four from the Progressive side, the government's majority can be easily wiped out. Six adverse votes would give a majority of one for the opposition amendment. The following names are on the slate for today's debate: Liberal, North Vancouver; A. J. Doucet, Conservative; Kent; W. T. Goodson, Liberal; Lambton, West; D. M. Kennedy, Progressive; Peace River; R. S. White, Conservative; Mount Royal; Premier King and Right Hon. Arthur Meighen. The first four were members of the committee which conducted the customs probe.

PAIR FOUND DEAD AFTER SQUABBLE

N. Y. Real Estate Man Believed Responsible For Double Tragedy in Home GLEN HEAD, N. Y., June 23.—The bodies of Sydney E. Brewster, New York real estate man, and his wife, were found last night in Mrs. Brewster's bedroom, each with a fatal bullet wound in the breast. Between them lay a pistol with two empty shells. The three servants had heard the young couple quarrelling earlier in the evening, and when they heard two shots, ran to the bedroom to find both dead. No immediate cause for the quarrel could be determined but the Brewsters were said to have quarrelled frequently. Who fired the two shots could not be determined at first, but the Nassau county police believed that Brewster did the shooting, as he was wounded in the left breast and his wife in the right. WOULD CUT IMPORTS

French Chambers of Commerce Agree to Co-operate With Government

PARIS, June 23.—The chambers of commerce of France are to collaborate with the government to bring about a reduction in imports until the safety of the franc is assured. At a meeting of the presidents of 94 departmental and municipal chambers adopted a resolution demanding that all chambers of commerce throughout the country begin immediately an inquiry as to unnecessary importations with a view to voluntarily lessening such importations.

CAILLAUX TAKES FINANCE POST

Is Working With Briand in Effort to Form New Cabinet

PARIS, June 23.—Joseph Caillaux, former Premier, has accepted the post of finance minister in the cabinet being formed by Premier Briand. Caillaux and Briand are working together in the formation of the cabinet, which M. Briand says he hopes to have ready tonight. Caillaux's acceptance followed reform of the Finance Ministry by former President Poincaré. M. Briand indicated that M. Caillaux, in all equity ought to have the right to choose those ministers directly connected with the administration of the economic life of the country.

COLSON IS FREED IN ABDUCTION CASE

Lawyer For Defence Studied in Saint John Under Crown Prosecutor

Special to The Times-Star ANDOVER, June 23.—In the case of the King vs. Lorenzo Colson, charged with abduction of the defence post, several witnesses and after addresses by counsel, the case went to the jury. The jury returned in 15 minutes with a verdict of not guilty. The verdict was greatly applauded and the officers had difficulty in restoring order. Colson was then discharged. Daniel Mullen, K. C., for the crown and Stephen G. Mooney for the defence. Court adjourned sine die. A feature of the trial was that Mr. Mooney, defence lawyer, studied law under Mr. Mullen, crown prosecutor.

FREDERICTON, June 23.—The question of pasteurized and raw milk, which has been a vexed one in some sections of the province, is dealt with in the Royal Gazette today in the publication of a lengthy notice, on the recommendation of the Minister of Health, which permits the sale of raw milk or raw cream. The wording of the opening section is as follows: "Notwithstanding any regulations of any sub-district board of health, it shall be lawful to sell, hold for sale and offer for sale for human consumption in the Province of New Brunswick milk and cream to be known as raw milk or raw cream."

Singing Tailor Blocks Traffic; Pays Penalty

NEW YORK, June 23.—Max Beran, who has attracted considerable notoriety through his attempts to break into grand opera, received a suspended sentence after being found guilty of disorderly conduct when he promised the Harlem Court that he would sing a new creation. 
FIRE AT McADAM

AMERICAN LEAGUE OF NATIONS PROPOSED AT TWO CONFERENCES

Common Action Against Aggressor State Agreed on at Panama

PANAMA, June 23.—A resolution recommending common action by the Pan-American states against any aggressor state has been unanimously adopted by the Pan-American Congress here. The resolution, drafted by Senor Arias, of Uruguay, recommends the nations of the New World to adopt as a policy of international relations the principle that every act carried out against any of them in violation of precepts universally recognized by international law be considered an offence to all these states, and therefore to provoke uniform and common reaction by all.

COSTA RICA AGREES

SAN JOS, Costa Rica, June 23.—The constitutional congress has voted favorably upon a motion for a league or union of the countries of the New World and for the principle of arbitration as a means for obtaining permanent peace.

Bennett To Speak In Alberta Campaign

EDMONTON, June 23.—Although Edmonton's 18 candidates for the five seats in the provincial house continue their campaign there has been a lull as far as the big guns of the political fight are concerned. This period of quiet will be broken tonight, when Hon. R. B. Bennett will make his first appearance of the campaign here in support of Conservative candidates. Captain J. T. Shaw, Liberal leader, will be here on Thursday night.
