BERLIN, Sept. 9—Dr. Otto Wiedfeldt, former German ambassador to the United States, now head of the Krupp directorate, has been designated as the prime mover in a scheme to unite the Rhenish steel industries in a huge combine embracing the Krupp, Phoenix, Rheinstahl, Thyssen companies and the Rhein-Elbe union.

The plan is to concentrate the activities of the company for the regulation of production in order to eliminate all competition and fluctuation in prices. The future character of the new concern, as yet, has not been revealed, but it is surmised that it will take the form of a limited company, with capital of eight hundred million marks.
