N. P. McLeod Wins In Collision Case

The action of N. P. McLeod, federal tax inspector, vs. Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of Fredericton was ended in chambers before Chief Justice Barry in Fredericton yesterday. The result was a verdict for the plaintiff for \$545.10. P. J. Hughes, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and C. L. Dougherty for the defence.

The suit was for damages sustained by the car of the plaintiff which was in collision with a city wagon as it left an alleyway adjacent the central fire station in King street, Fredericton. The wheel of the wagon struck the car and tore the top off.

The contention of the defence was that the driver had tried to stop his car before it came in collision with the wagon. The accident occurred in the summer of 1923.

Bad \$10 Bills Are Taken In Montreal

MONTREAL, Dec. 7.—Spurious Bank of Montreal \$10 bills are in circulation in the city, but to what extent the police are ignorant, although two cases have been brought to their notice since Friday.

This morning two foreigners were detained after they had tried to pass a bad note at the Money Order Department in the General Postoffice. The men, however, satisfactorily explained where the money came from, were not placed under arrest.

CONGRESS ASSEMBLES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 7.—The sixty-third congress of the United States assembled today for its first session with the House facing another three cornered contest over the speakership as the result of a new challenge to the Republican leadership by the insurgent group of that party.

TURKS CONTROL KURDS

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 7.—The Turkish government purposed to keep a firm hand on the Kurds of Anatolia until the Mosul trouble is over. Accordingly it has decided to prolong the state of martial law in the eastern provinces of Anatolia for another year.

NORMAL SCHOOL BURNS

MOUNT PLEASANT, Mich., Dec. 7.—Fire of undetermined origin, early today destroyed the main building and library of the Central State Normal School here, with an estimated loss of \$500,000.

TOBACCO CHIEF DIES

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.—Perceval S. Hill, president of the American Tobacco Company, died suddenly at his Park avenue home today.

Put The Transcontinental To Work

Continued from Page 1.

"The line was built for one main specific reason; if anyone doubts this all they have to do is to read some six assorted volumes of Hansard in the years 1903-04 and to recall the millions of words uttered in the course of the federal election campaign of 1904. The line was built so that, in the winter months at any rate, grain could be hauled over it to the Maritime ports at a rate which would be pretty nearly competitive with summer lake and rail rates, and thus avoid using United States routes.

"The line was to be built at a high standard with a minimum of curves and a minimum of grades. It was built in this manner and it set the people of Canada back, to use a colloquialism, the tidy sum of \$170,000,000 as aforesaid.

"Except for a brief period in 1916, when the line was taken over from the contractors, practically not a single bushel of grain has been hauled over it. For one very good reason. The line could haul grain at a low figure and when it showed how low it could the government put the rate up to a figure which put the line as a hauler of grain out of business. The rate was raised 400 per cent.

"The people of Canada are beginning to ask why. Especially in the Maritimes where there is need for grain hauling as a business for their people, the line is being starved for the lack of freight from upper Canada.

"The Free Press feels at this stage like asking a few why notes on its own account and on that of the people of the Maritimes and of the West also. Such as:

"Why not put the line to the use for which it was built?

"Why not put in a rate which will enable the large carry-over of the western grain this season to go out through Canadian ports instead of by Buffalo in the spring?

"Why cannot parliament either put in such a rate as a statutory figure or extend the Crown's Nest rate eastward?

"Above all, why can the government not see that this is a way of keeping faith with the people of Canada, who authorized an immense expenditure to have this line built up to a high standard for a particular purpose which has never been fulfilled?

"The people in Canada, we think, like to find out just whose sheltered interests are so needful of protection at the hands of the Railway Commission that the faith has to be broken with the people of Canada, the Canadian ports have to be starved of their legitimate trade, that \$170,000,000 has to lie neglected and that the port of Buffalo has to be built up. It is indubitably true for a show-down."

"Grotesque" says the Toronto Globe.

The Toronto Globe makes a striking reference to the Transcontinental and Maritime ports. It says:

"It would appear that the Provinces by the sea are at last making some impression on the other parts of the Dominion. The endorsement of their resolutions at the recent Dominion Boards of Trade meeting at Winnipeg was a start, though it must be said that the practical side of the issue—the only side which can bring results—has yet to be settled by the Dominion government. With the Cabinet may be coupled, perhaps, the Canadian National Railway, which operates to the Atlantic both through Halifax and Saint John in Canada and through Portland in Maine.

"The shorter distance by the Portland route imposes a physical handicap on the Maritime ports, but if Vancouver has a right to a freight rate no higher per mile over the mountains than the charge to the eastward, as is contended by the Railway Commission, though opposed by the railways, surely there is something to be said on national grounds for fair treatment for Halifax and Saint John.

"It is a grotesque condition that a great railway system should be built through the Canadian hinterland to connect the grain fields with Eastern ports and its rails left to rust for lack of traffic which seeks other and too often foreign outlets.

"Mr. Baxter does well to meet the leaders of the other Provinces, and though it may not be possible to grant all the requests of the Maritimes, who, after all, have a considerable obligation to help themselves, a temperate statement of the Eastern case is bound to bring results in the long run."
