U. S. Coal Owners Agree To Proposals Made By Miners

REDS FALL TO THE BERLIN UNIONS

TO PREVENT
SUSPENSION
OF MINING

U. S. Coal Commission In-
tervenes Between Men
and Operators.

MAY RESUME WAGES

Union Officials and Mine
Owners' Representatives
to Meet Tomorrow.

(By Canadian Press)
New York, Aug. 16.—A way to pre-
vent suspension of anthracite coal
mining after Sept. 1, was opened to-
day by the intervention of the U. S.
coal commission in the deadlock be-
tween the miners union and the op-
erators which has hitherto prevailed.
Officials of the miners union yester-
day proposed to the commission to
abandon their demand for "check-off"
of union dues if the operators would
cease their practice of collecting ex-
plosive and fuel accounts by the same
method, and after conference last night
the operators agreed to the proposal
in full.

FURS ARE HIGHER
