SHOP INJUNCTION GRANTED IN U. S.

Chicago, Sept. 23.—Judge James H. Wilkerson today granted Attorney-General Daugherty's petition for a nation-wide temporary injunction against the striking railway shopmen. Judge Wilkerson in a lengthy review of the case, said the defendants could not deny knowledge and responsibility for the widespread violence which has marked the strike. Partial settlement of the strike, he held, has not affected the right of the government to obtain a nation-wide injunction.

MANY PEOPLE ARE PREPARING FOR THE BIG GAME SEASON

Hunting Resorts Are Said to be Prepared to Entertain Record Number of Nimrods This Year.

This week will see the arrival of many tourists from across the border who will come here to hunt big game in the favorite game resorts of the province, as the regular season will open on Monday, Oct. 2. Already several non-resident hunters have gone into the woods, having taken advantage of the extra time granted by the taking out of a special license upon the payment of an additional fee.

The hunting grounds of the province are well known by sportsmen in the United States and Great Britain, and many of them recount with delight the days spent in such districts as the Tobique, Restigouche, Cain's River, Cusson and Miramichi. The hunting season brings many distinguished visitors to the province, and it may be said in favor of the non-resident sportsmen that they have always been found ready to act in accordance with the game laws of the province, while there have been cases in which they were not very familiar with the provisions of the game act. The season for moose and deer opens on Oct. 1 and closes on Nov. 30, but the season for turkeys is prohibited. The license allows the holder to take one moose and two deer. There is no open season for caribou. Hunters are protected, but a limited number may be taken by special permit. Mink, otter, fisher and sable may be hunted from Nov. 1 to March 31, and muskrat from March 25 to April 30. Foxes may be hunted from Oct. 1 to Feb. 28. Partridge have been protected for several years, but an open season has been set again this year from Oct. 1 to 21, by order-in-council of the provincial government, as they are becoming plentiful. The season for quail, woodcock, plover, yellow legs and snipe opens on Sept. 15 and closes on Nov. 30. The season for ducks, geese and brant opens on the same date but extends until Dec. 31. The sale of migratory birds and the shooting of seagulls, pheasants, song birds and all insectivorous birds is prohibited.

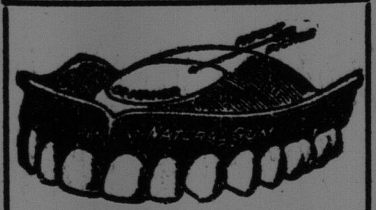
RALLY SERVICES IN SEVERAL CITY SUNDAY SCHOOLS

FORD HAS BIGGEST INCOME IN WORLD

Wall Street Journal Estimates Net Profits for 1922 at \$110,000,000.

New York, Sept. 25.—A revival of the controversy as to the world's richest man appeared in the Wall Street Journal, which declared Henry Ford richly deserved the title. The previous discussion apparently ended with Ford and John D. Rockefeller immovably tied for the honor. A news bulletin in the "Journal" says: "Henry Ford has the Ford Motor Company the largest income, and, if capitalized, the largest fortune in the world."

"Profits before taxes for 1922 will exceed \$125,000,000. After taxes they will be \$110,000,000, about \$100 a car. With these earnings the Ford Motor Company would be capitalized at \$2,000,000,000 and pay five per cent. on that capital.

"Ford condemns bankers, but with \$180,000,000 cash, he himself is the largest individual banker in this country, if not in the world. A few millions are hoarded in Detroit. Wall street—the finance centre of the country—absorbs the millions and Ford's accumulated profits multiply with Wall street assistance."

"In his newspaper interviews Ford says that Wall street and the gold standard have outlived their usefulness, but his millions flow through to Wall street at four per cent. to bring his company a possible \$7,200,000 gold standard money annually in interest. This is more than \$6 for every car he produces.

"Even a Republican Congress intends to add to the Ford wealth. The company paid more than \$50,000,000 in federal taxes in 1921. Because of the abolition of the excess profits levy, it will pay only \$16,000,000 in 1922. The Ford is \$84,000,000 richer, though if they were to draw the riches out they would pay more than fifty per cent. additional in personal income taxes.

"Henry Ford is a Wall street man himself, and the few blocks of Woodward avenue running past his factories in Detroit from a companion thoroughfare with the few blocks of Wall street from Trinity church to the East River, if he continues to pile up cash at this rate he cannot long denounce Wall street or the money power of the country.

"Henry Ford will be that money power."
