

## PARLEYS MAY END FOR LACK OF WORK

Allyes Admit They Have a Treaty That May Never be Signed But Apparently Fear to Adopt Ultimatum Attitude.

(Canadian Press)  
Lausanne, June 18.—The Near East conference shows signs of dying from inertia. The conference has practically ceased work; everything has been adjourned except concessions and the Ottoman debt, but the solution of the latter is not in sight. Otherwise, the treaty is set in type.

The delegations are simply sitting around waiting for something to happen; the Allies admit that the treaty may never be signed unless Turkey meets the Allied views on the payment of the interest on the debt. The Allies feel they are being forced into presenting a treaty to Turkey with a demand that it be signed, but apparently fear to adopt an ultimatum attitude because they are not sure that it would be effective. They remember that the Turks refused to sign in February when this was done, and no one wants the responsibility of a rupture, particularly as the Turks and the Allies are really not far apart.

The Allies assert that Turkey is diverting into its treasury revenue that should go to the debt council to pay interest and that what little funds reach the council are eaten up by the cost of maintaining the council.

M. Venizelos is also worried, fearing that peace between Greece and Turkey may become impossible if a general treaty is not signed. Venizelos and Ahmet Fasha are exchanging mutual reproaches charging that each is guilty of offenses against the other's nationals.

## \$100,000 NECKLACE FOUND CUT UP

Mrs. Wm. E. Corey's Pearls Recovered, but Mystery of Disappearance Unsolved.

Paris, June 14.—All of Mrs. William E. Corey's pearls have been found. The mystery of the disappearance of the necklace, which has occupied the police of London and Paris for a week, is not quite cleared up, but at least the wife of the New York millionaire has the satisfaction of knowing that none of the precious trinkets has disappeared. Following discovery of the larger part of the necklace in Mrs. Corey's automobile, there has come the discovery of twelve of the largest pearls in the possession of Paris jewel merchants. By whom the gems were stolen still remains to be learned. According to a statement of Mrs. Corey she locked them safely in her jewel case before she went to London last week.

In London she discovered her loss, and immediately telegraphed to her servants at her chateau. For three days the pearls were sought in vain. Then a chauffeur found a broken string among the cushions of an automobile in which he had driven Mrs. Corey to the station in Paris before his departure.

During these days the automobile had been in a repair shop. When found the necklace was cut and the dozen biggest pearls in the string had been abstracted. By whom and when is the problem which Paris police have now to discover, but their task seems to have been considerably facilitated by the discovery of the purchasers.

## Chilean Girls Are Pretty and Up to Minute in Style

Greater Freedom Granted Young Women of Southern Republic Than in Any Other Latin Country.

London, May 20.—(By Mail).—"Chile is the most delightful of the South American republics. The climate is perfect, the people are hospitable, living is reasonable, and there is no income tax," writes Arthur Mills in "The London Daily Mail."

"Chileans and British have much in common. The Chileans have a strong sense of national spirit and take a pride in their country, which their neighbors know better than to offend."

"Toward the end of the war they republiques, with no seaboard and no troops, declared war on Germany, took to killing German traders and looting German stores. Chile remained neutral and became a refuge for Germans throughout South America."

"She can have gained nothing by giving sanctuary to a hostile nation. That she did so should command our respect. But she might go a step further. Chile today is flooded with German capital and German rivals to British trade."

"When disputes arise over nitrate deals and other matters British traders claim that the Chilean Government favors the German, who, living in that country to evade his war debt, has become a wealthy and powerful member of the community. This fact has repeatedly been brought to the notice of both British and Chilean Governments, but nothing is done about it."

"The social and commercial life of Chile is divided between Valparaiso and Santiago. Valparaiso still bears traces of the terrible earthquakes of 1906; it is linked with Santiago by a pretty stretch for railway running through the foothills of the Andes. As a city Santiago is not so fine as Rio de Janeiro, Montevideo or Buenos Ayres, but there are many splendid new buildings springing up."

"During the summer months Chilean society foregathers at Vina del Mar, a fashionable seaside resort near Valparaiso. None of the hotels or houses is on the seashore and the sea is so gradually cold that only the hardiest set foot in it."

"Nevertheless, 'Vina' is delightful. Here British and Chilean society intermingle in a way to be found nowhere else in South America. The Chilean elite of good family is not only very pretty, but also most emancipated. At 'Vina', at the Gran Hotel, on dance nights it is quite a common sight to see three young Englishmen and two or three Chilean girls—a state of affairs inconceivable in other parts of South America, where Moorish and Latin traditions still regulate social life."

"Chile's prosperity depends on her ocean-going trade and she is the part-mountain sea power of South America, if not in actual tonnage, then certainly in naval armament and fighting efficiency. The Chilean is a born sailor, whereas neither the Argentine nor the Brazilian takes kindly to the sea."

"The real soul of Chile lies in her limitless mineral wealth; in her copper mines, such as Chuquibambilla, and the nitrate fields above Antofagasta. She is the second greatest copper producing country in the world, but, curiously enough, there is no tax on copper, and she depends for her prosperity on the sale of nitrate."

"As with cattle in Argentina, so with nitrate in Chile; after the war there was over-production followed by a slump. Today Chile is recovering, her sales of nitrate for the current twelve months are most promising."

"There are fair openings on the nitrate fields in Northern Chile for young Englishmen of good education, but no opening at all for British unskilled or semi-skilled labor. On the nitrate fields an Englishman after six or seven years should be earning £40 a month, all found, with the possibility of rising to manager at £1,000 a year."

"The nitrate country is as bleak and sun parched as the rocks of Eden, but the nights are cool and the life is health. Many a man has cursed the 'coast,' as they call the northern half of Chile, but the 'coast,' like the East, has a call of its own."

## GERMANY HAS MARRIAGE BOOM

License Clerks are Doing More Business Than Before the War.

Berlin, May 24.—(By The Associated Press).—(By mail).—Fewer babies are being born in Germany now than before the war and fewer people are dying, but the marriage license clerks are doing more business than during 1913.

The Germans say there is a boom in the marriage market "after every war." The state of Hamburg lived up to its name of having the most attractive "frauleins" in the republic. It chalked up a wedding record of about fifteen to every 1,000 inhabitants. Schaumburg-Lippe, a little to the south of Hamburg and in romantic proximity to Steinhuder Lake, ran a close second with fourteen to every 1,000. Saxony's proportion stopped at slightly over thirteen, while Berlin's was only 12.8. The most timid bachelors in all Germany appear to live in the mountainous state of Waldeck, in the Weser basin, where there have been only about seven weddings to every 1,000 residents. And yet the Waldeck boys have not such faint hearts as before the war, when their averages was only 5.4.

The statistics for Wurttemberg, Mecklenburg-Schwerin and Mecklenburg-Strelitz have not yet been received at official headquarters here, but including these three states, Germany's marriage rate last year was 10.9 for every 1,000 inhabitants, compared with only 6.6 in 1913.

Babies appeared in the state reported at the rate of 23 for every 1,000, as against a proportion of 28.9 before the war. Most of the births were registered in Upper Silesia and the least in Berlin. The former's proportion was approximately 32, the latter's less than 12.

Germans have been dying at the rate of 12.8 out of each 1,000 the last twelve months, a proportion of 28.9 before the war. Most of the deaths were registered in Upper Silesia, which had the highest birth rate, also led in the ration of deaths.
