**MARSHAL FRENCH IS EARL OF YPRES**  
London, June 7.—When a year ago it was announced that Field Marshal French had been raised to an earldom, it was assumed that he would continue to use his surname in the title and be known as Earl French instead of Viscount French.  
His title, however, was never gazetted, and an announcement yesterday was the first indication that he had chosen the title Earl of Ypres, and he henceforth will be known as Ypres, dropping the name of French. While it is not uncommon for naval and military commanders to associate scenes of victories with peerages conferred upon them, as in the instance of Earl Roberts of Kandahar, it is very unusual for a British peer to take the name of a foreign place as a title and there are only a few examples of this in British records.

**TRAPPERS CAPTURE AN 80-POUND WOLF**  
Large Animal Bagged Alive and Put on Public Display.  
Iron Mountain, Mich., June 7.—State wolf trappers bagged a large timber wolf alive near Lathrop. The animal tipped the scales at eighty pounds. It has been on display for a few days, but the "death sentence" will be carried out in a day or two.  
The wolf was caught only by a front paw. The trapper tied its legs and mouth and then summoned an automobile to carry it to Lathrop.  
Two other large wolves, a coyote and three foxes were trapped, and a large family of wolf whelps exterminated during the last few days.

Toronto, director of the White Cross Mission to the Balkans, in a letter to the Quebec Chronicle from Bari, Italy, states that he was notified by the Italian consul at Soutari, before he left Albania, that the royal ministry of Italy was unable to award him a proposed honor because the British government had refused permission to award the same.
