### WAR BARED NEED FOR PSYCHIATRY

Mental Ills Found to Be Pre-  
valent — Dr. Pearce Bailey  
Suggests Remedies for  
Conditions Revealed Dur-  
ing Struggle.

The applicability of ordinary life of  
what was discovered through the neuro-  
psychiatric examinations in the army  
about the prevalence and nature of  
nervous and mental diseases was dis-  
cussed last week at the final session of  
the third convention of the Society for Mental  
Hygiene, at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel,  
New York, in a paper written by Dr.  
Pearce Bailey, chairman of the New  
York State Commission on Mental De-  
fectives. According to Dr. Bailey—  
The neuropsychiatric examinations  
disclosed an astonishingly large number  
of men suffering from nervous and men-  
tal diseases or defects. As compared  
with other groups of diseases, the nervous  
and mental group stood fourth in  
order of frequency, rejection for these  
causes being exceeded only by rejections  
based on physical defects affecting eye,  
ear, nose and throat, bones and joints,  
heart and blood vessels.

"The nervous and mental group had  
a sanitary and economic importance in  
relative standing by no means indicated.  
Many of the purely physical disqualifi-  
cations, while making soldiers inef-  
fective, would prevent him from com-  
peting on equal terms in many civil  
occupations. In contrast to that,  
rejection for nervous causes not only  
implied an economic inferiority, but also  
—and this especially in the most nume-  
rous class, the feeble-minded—that the  
individuals were actual hindrances to  
civilization and were prone to increase  
rapidly their kind."

"Up to May 1, 1919, the army re-  
turned to the civil community approxi-  
mately 17,000 men unfit for military  
service caused by nervous or mental  
disease."

"Such persons are not only ineffective  
themselves, but they make others in-  
effective. It is in them that mental  
contagion, which leads up to hysterical  
mass movements, spreads and with the  
greatest rapidity, and in their minds  
sedition finds an easier root than rea-  
son. They are sick persons, whose  
symptoms appear as abnormal be-  
havior. Their prevalence concerns the  
health of the country, but still more, it  
concerns the country's morale. No real  
reconstruction for them can take place  
until the problem they present is un-  
derstood by the non-medical community.  
Doctors must ascertain the facts in the  
first place, but it is from men who are  
sick."
