EXPORT FREIGHT WHEN VALLEY RAILWAY READY

Statements by C. A. Hayes of C. N. R., Here With Other Officials Today

"Export freight coming from the west over the Canadian National Railways for St. John will be brought to this city by way of the Transcontinental and Valley railways as soon as the latter road is ready for operation."

As the connecting link between Gagetown and Westfield is not yet complete, the party was unable to cover that section in their trip of inspection and this afternoon Mr. Hayes intends to take up the matter more fully with the directors of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company.

Regarding passenger traffic by the new route, Mr. Hayes said they would have to feel their way and develop the service as the demand warranted.

In answer to a question about the prospect for the establishment of a government line of steamers between St. John and Vancouver, via the Panama canal, Mr. Hayes said that they were canvassing the situation to ascertain the amount of business which would be available.

The chief object of the present trip is to enable George Stephens, freight traffic manager at Toronto who was traffic manager with the C. N. R. before the amalgamation, and the other officials to become acquainted with the portions of the road with which they were not familiar, and also to become acquainted with each other.

The other officials in the party are A. T. Weldon, assistant freight traffic manager, Montreal; Guy Toombs, assistant freight traffic manager, Montreal; C. Price Green, commissioner of industries and resources of the C. N. R., Toronto; H. E. Clark, C. E. Fries, A. J. Gray, H. H. James and F. J. Grey, Toronto.

Mr. Hayes remarked this morning that an inspection of the entire government railway system as it is today was a wonderful experience. It made one realize as hardly anything else could, the vastness and completeness of Canada's resources and her ability to supply all the varied needs of a modern civilization.
