WERNER HORNE ADMITS BLOWING UP BRIDGE
Jersey City, N.J., Sept. 28.—Werner Horne admitted before United States Commissioner Carpenter here today that he blew up the Canadian Pacific railway bridge over the St. Croix River at McAdam (N.B.) on February 25, 1915, but insisted that it was a military act committed in a hostile country during war time.
"Yes, I did it," said Horne to the commissioner. "I did it in behalf of my country, my fatherland, as an officer of the German army in war time. I caused the explosion that blew up the bridge. The admission was made at a hearing on a petition of the Canadian government for Horne's extradition to Canada.
Horne, who came into the courtroom smiling and with the expectation of being released, was visibly affected when the Canadian law showing that he was liable to life imprisonment if extradited to that country was read.

AGAINST STRICTLY FRESH AIR IN SCHOOL ROOMS
New York, Sept. 27.—Fresh air is not as beneficial as "semi-fresh" air and children who have suffered more from malnutrition through war conditions than poor children, were statements made today at the international conference of women physicians. The attack on fresh air was made by Dr. W. A. McCall of the New York Teachers' College, and the question of nutrition was dealt with by Dr. Henry L. K. Shaw of Albany.
Dr. McCall based his conclusion on recent elaborate experiments by the New York State Commission on ventilation. He said that these investigations showed that public school children are slightly less efficient and make slightly less improvement in psychological, educational and physical measurements when under strictly fresh air than when under air that is semi-fresh.
Dr. Shaw urged better physical and medical care of children, advising frequent medical examinations for them. Urging a campaign for health instruction in schools, Dr. Frederick Peterson, said that in Kansas last year the State appropriated \$25,000 for the care, health and rearing of piglets and \$40,000 for the health of children.
LOTS OF WORK FOR THE PROFESSIONAL SHOPPER
London, Sept. 27.—High railway fares and the increased expenditure occasioned by the termination of the war, has brought out the professional shopper who is finding that her circle of clients is rapidly widening.
One woman who knows the art of dress has recently taken up the work with marked success.
"I have become a professional shopper," she said, "and the women in the provinces are beginning to find me useful. I work for a great many women who live a long way from London, some of them in the far northern counties. These women, knowing the smartest and best things can only be found in London, and by one who knows London well, prefer to employ me to do their shopping than to make use of the catalogue. I dress entire families. Sometimes people come to me when they are in London. At other times they write, leaving the selection of their dresses entirely in my hands, and I send them just what I know will suit them. Of course I charge a commission, but it is infinitely smaller than the railway fare and the money wasted in going to the wrong shop and buying the wrong materials."

BRITISH AGAIN WARN RHINE SEPARATISTS

Will Allow No Change in German Government in Occupied Territory.
The decided stand against the renewal of the Separatist agitation in the occupied territory in the Rhineland taken by the British military authorities is again illustrated by the following official notice printed at the top of the front page of the Kolnische Zeitung on Aug. 22.
"It is hereby announced that so long as the British military authorities exercise control over the district occupied by British troops no change in the form of the German government of this district will be allowed and that no new authority will be recognized without the previous approval of the British military authorities.
"Any person opposing, or helping to oppose, the sense of this announcement makes himself liable to imprisonment or expulsion from the occupied territory, or both."
"G. S. CLIVE, Major General, British Military Governor, Occupied German Territory."

The Frankfurter Zeitung recently printed a dispatch from Ludwigshafen, one of the cities occupied by the French from which the movement for the semi-independence of the Rhineland is being promoted, purporting to show that several of the agitators were very undesirable citizens. The dispatch read:
"The real agitators in the movement for a buffer state in the Palatinate, the promoters paid with French money, are the managing editor of the Free Press, a man named Emrich, who is said to have been discharged from the army because of mental weakness, and an alleged German-American, called Eggersdorf. The latter recently had the assurance to call a meeting in Ludwigshafen under French protection which resulted in such a violent expression of opposition as to give him a physical reminder as good as the one given to the near-revolters in Speyer on June 1.
"But that didn't hinder the valiant man from asserting in his newspaper that the meeting was a brilliant success. But this Eggersdorf is really accustomed to other experiences. It has been established that he is a common criminal who has served time for various thefts and frauds and who was reduced to the status of second-class soldier while in the army for stealing from his comrades. His real name is not Eggersdorf, but Alvens, and he has taken part as a leader in several Spartacist near-revolts, including the one at Darmstadt."
"So General Gerard, who was sent to London by the French government for the purpose of preventing the spread of Bolshevist-Spartacist influences to the occupied territory, is in the very painful position of nourishing in his bosom a Spartacist serpent and the French government has been most actively supporting a man who desires nothing more than to carry the torch of Bolshevism into the occupied territory and from there into France. It is even proposed that this Eggersdorf, the criminal and Spartacist whom even the Darmstadt Independent Socialists expelled from their ranks, become the minister of finance of the new republic of the Palatinate."

Italian Government Sustained.
On a vote of confidence being taken in the Italian Chamber of Deputies on Saturday the government received 208 votes to 140. The Allies may now make a move at Fiume, fearing a Balkan war.
