**Housing Reform.**  
J. L. Sugrue said that he thought a community council would be a good thing and that the first matter that it should take up was the question how to secure better housing accommodation for the workers. What is required are proper houses for this class that could be occupied at fair rentals.

C. H. Stevens said that if better housing accommodation and better conditions generally were provided much of the intemperance about which so much has been said would cease.

F. Hyatt pleaded for a plan of free collection of garbage and the instant abolition of the chain gang.

Rev. J. A. McKelgan advocated the appointment of a community council, and laid stress on the need of playgrounds.

**The Color Line.**  
R. H. McIntyre, who said he spoke as an old resident and knew conditions well here, referred to the difficulty experienced amongst the colored population in getting proper houses to live in, and deprecated the prejudice that he said existed to the disadvantage of his own people.

C. B. Howard spoke of the Y. M. C. A. work and of the difficulty that had been experienced in getting suitable grounds where sports could be enjoyed. T. H. Estabrooks said he thought it might be wise to appoint a nominating committee and moved in amendment accordingly. Rev. H. E. Thomas seconded. The amendment was carried.

Mrs. Fiske moved, seconded by J. L. Sugrue, that the nominating committee consist of one representative of each organization having delegates present at the meeting. This was carried and the meeting proceeded to elect the committee with the result stated.
