London, Wednesday, Jan. 30.—An increase in British shipping losses is shown in the official summary issued tonight which reports the destruction of nine vessels of more than 1,600 tons and six of lesser tonnage.

The official statement follows: “Arrivals, 2,832; sailings, 2,808. Over, sunk by mine or submarine, nine; under 1,600 tons, six; fishing vessels, one. ‘British merchant’ men unsuccessfully attacked, eight.”

### COMMONS REJECT THE AMENDMENT

London, Jan. 30.—The House of Commons this evening by a vote of 228 to 118 rejected the amendment of the House of Lords to the representation of the people's bill establishing the principle of proportional representation in parliamentary elections. The government took no action on either side, but left the house a free hand to vote on the amendment. The House of Commons has since before had rejected the principle of proportional representation.

### STRIKING WORKMEN OF GERMANY PRESENT MATUM TO THEIR GOVT

**HINDENBURG WARNS BERLIN STRIKERS.**

Amsterdam, Jan. 30.—The Rhenische Westfälische Zeitung, of Essen, a copy of which has been received here, reports that Field Marshal von Hindenburg has warned the strikers in Berlin to cease their movement immediately. He told them, according to this newspaper, that they were being misled, adding: “Every strike means the weakening of Germany's defence. You are committing a crime against our army and our country. I am warning you to stop striking in the front trenches.”

**BERLIN NEWSPAPERS ARE NOT PUBLISHED.**

Only a few telegrams have arrived in Copenhagen from Germany, an Exchange Telegraph despatch from the German capital, and news is scarce owing to the fact that most of the important Berlin newspapers have not been published.

The military authorities in Berlin district, according to the Berlin correspondent of the Copenhagen Politiken, have prohibited all meetings convened to discuss public questions as well as workmen's meetings, and demonstrations.

Fifty thousand workmen have ceased work at 11 A.M. The strike is now general in the Berlin district, which is the most important industrial section in Saxony. Field Marshal von Hindenburg's proclamation appealing to the workers to stop striking, appeared on all the street corners of Berlin yesterday.

### STILL GROWING IN ENTHUSIASM

London, Jan. 31.—The German strike is still growing in magnitude, the Exchange Telegraph correspondent at Copenhagen reports. In Berlin 700,000 persons are on strike, he reports, 86,000 of these being women.

A great number of Socialist leaders have been arrested in various German towns, according to this authority. The fact that Berlin is wrapped in a thick fog has made it impossible for the authorities to prevent the demonstration of pamphlets, the report states.

### FIRE AT THREE RIVERS

Three Rivers, Que., Jan. 31.—Fire here yesterday did damage amounting to \$6,000 to the factory of C. P. Gelinas & Freres, Limited, and \$19,000 to the building occupied by the Pinsonnault Ltd. Anselme Lamire, a fireman, sustained serious injuries in falling from a ladder.

**Tunnel For Vehicles.**

Washington, Jan. 31.—Proposals to build a tunnel roadway for vehicles under the Hudson River and connecting New York and New Jersey will be discussed at a conference between the governors and the congressional representatives of the two states and the mayors of the two cities in New York within a few days. It is proposed that the two cities shall pay two-thirds of the cost and the federal government the remainder.
