A Children's Colony

The scheme for establishing a self-governing colony for both boys and girls in England, on the lines of the George Yunni Republic in America, is well on the way to fulfilment, and the first colony will be established at Flowers' Farm, in Dorset. The farm is beautifully situated in wooded and well-watered country, and the architect's dreams go beyond the actual planning of houses, court, offices, etc. to a swimming hath made at the junction of two streams, one of which, called the Wriggle, is sure to entice by its humarous name.

At Flowers' Farm, in keeping with the best spirit of social reform today, girls are included in the scheme, and will work side by side with the boys, sharing all responsibilities and all priviliges.

Contrary to expectation, it is now stated that in all probability King Alfonso will not accompany Queen Victoria when she visits Princess Henry of Battenburg in the Isle of Wight in August. It is quite out of the question, owing to the state of Morocco and the long protection of the negotiations with France that His Majesty should leave Spain for the attractions of Cowes week. He will, however, content himself with hearing of the performances of his yachts in German waters, where they are now taking part in the international events at Kiel.

Lloyd George Interviewed

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Mr. Lloyd-George has been interviewed by the London correspondent of the "Neue Frie Press," and a long communication sent by the journalist covers practically every point in the chancellor's political faith. He explained to his interviewer that the glory of the Liberal party consists in its being able to unite the wealthy middle, and working classes in the service of democratic progress. He sounds again the note of alarm regarding the demands for armaments, and says that, unless the nations of the world take care, there will soon be no money for social reform, for state finance is being invested in guns and warships.

He is reported to have exclaimed "Since I, a radical democrat, have been chancellor, the navy budget has risen by 60,000,000. The largest part of the Brit sh nation, irrespective of party, is, like nyself, horrified at that all-devouring the content of the party.

The huge reward, \$50,000 offered for the recovery of the will of the late Sir John Murray Scott, does not break the record. Five hundred thousand francs (equivalent to \$100,000) was offered in 1894 for the recovery of an American schoolboy, Webster Conkling, who mysteriously disappeared in Pavis. The boy, fifteen years old, was on his way to the St. Lazare Railway Station in Paris in company with one one of his schoolmasters. The master lost sight of the boy for an instant and, turning round, found that he had disappeared as though the earth had swallowed him Conkling's mother, a wealthy widow, began by offering 25,000 francs for his recovery, and then increased the reward to ne\$100,000. The money was deposited in Munroe's Bank in the Rue Scribe, but never found a claimant.

Another band of artists have hurled a manifesto at this philistine world. Marinetti and his futurists have barely left the stage before there enters the new society of X-ites. Their symbol, X, may at present be an unknown quantity in the art world, but they intend that it shall become the hall-mark of known quality. The X-ites, who have sprung up in Chelsea, are about thirty-five in number, and most of them are old pupils of Professor Moira, of the Royal College of Art. They stand for no French cult of portraying the "feel" of things, they paint petures, in fact, just like real artists, but the X-ites to a man are united in one resolve. They are out to smash the tyranny of names. When the new school hold their first exhibition, at 25 Bedford street, Strand, during June, the public will search their catalogues in vain for the name of the artist who is responsible for any single picture.

Instead they will read: "Landscape, by Value" and the site of the single picture.

London, June 12—The costume ball to be held at Olympia on July 3 in aid of King George's pension fund promises to be one of the most brilliant affairs of the season. Under the direct patronage of His Majesty, it will be attended by prominent people of rank and fashion.

With the assistance of F. G. Plummer and a committee of the Royalist Club, under whose auspices the coronation ball took place, the work of organization for the Ambassadors' Ball is being taken in hand by F. H. Payne, of "Miracle," fame.

Mr. Payne said that he and his committee had arranged that the beautiful decorations and fittings for the International Horse Show should remain intact for the ball, and that these would be added to in a most sumptuous manner.

"Around the vast interior," said Mr. Payne, "will be trelliswork arches thick with rambler roses. 



SUFREME COURT JUDGMENTS

Fredericton, June 21—Judgments we wen by the supreme court today as for ows: In case of O'Regan vs. C. P. Railway ompany, appeal allowed to set aside a erdict for a plaintiff and enter a verdict or the defendant. The court was unani-

for the defendant. The court was unanimous.

In cases of McCatherin vs. Jamer and Ralston vs. Jamer—The judgment of the court is to set aside the non-suit and to enter a verdict for \$15 for the plaintiff in each case.

In case of St. John River Steamship Company Ltd. vs. Crystal Stream Steamship Company Ltd—The court gave judgment sustaining the decision of Judge Landry and dismissing the appeal with costs.

In case of Connely et al vs. Trustees of School District No. 8, parish of Havelock—Judgment was that the lien on the school building in that district granted the plaintiffs be affirmed and the appeal dismissed with costs.

In case of Jack vs. Carney et al—Appeal allowed with costs and judgment was ordered to be entered for the defendant in the court below.

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In case of the King vs. Matheson, ex parte Shilala—Rule was discharged and conviction affirmed.

In case of the King vs. J. W. Taylor, justice of peace for the county of York—Judge Barry granted an order nisi to quash the conviction of Graham and Embleton under the Canada Lord's Day Act, and no one appearing to support the conviction the rule nisi was made absolute. Next in rank to the attorney general of England as a legal officer comes the solicitor general.
