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INCOME TAX LIEN WILL BE REPEALED

MINISTER OF FINANCE TO MAKE MOTION

Resolution To Appear
On Order Paper
Monday

PASSED LAST YEAR

Law Provided Unpaid Levy
Would Be Lien Against
Tax Payer's Assets

OTTAWA, Ont., May 29.—The income tax lien is to be repealed. Hon. J. A. Robb, acting Minister of Finance, intends to bring down a bill to repeal the amendment to the income tax act, passed last session, creating a lien.

This amendment provided that any assessed tax, interest or penalty unpaid after the date of mailing of the assessment, should constitute a lien upon the assets of the taxpayer, notwithstanding lack of notice, registration or publication.

A resolution by Mr. Robb preceding a bill to repeal the section will appear on the order paper of the House on Monday.

BATTLE POSSIBLE OVER DETROIT SPAN

Municipal and Company Projects Clash—Arbitration Proposed by Mayor.

WINDSOR, Ont., May 29.—Possibility of a legal battle between Detroit and Windsor on one side, and the American Transit Company on the other over the building of a bridge spanning the Detroit River, loomed up yesterday, when Mayor Mitchell, of Windsor, appointed a committee to arbitrate with the company.

The American Transit Company holds a franchise to construct the bridge. It is to learn whether the transit company will assist the two cities in building a bridge or whether they will continue with their plans in spite of the municipal project, that Mayor Mitchell appointed his committee.

MAKES REPLY TO COUNCIL OF AMBASSADORS

Allied Disarmament Note Likely Ready Next Week

DATA CONSIDERED

Payments Under Dawes Plan Up to May 1 Are Examined

BRITISH REPLY

Outlining the British government's views regarding Germany's proposals for a Western European security pact, was sent to the French government today. This followed consideration by the Baldwin cabinet of the note from Foreign Minister Briand of France elucidating, as the British government had requested, the French reply to Germany regarding the proposed pact.

Official circles expressed the hope that as a result of British suggestions it will soon be possible for France to send to Berlin, a note representing a Franco-British agreement on the security question.

The meeting of the Council of Ambassadors tomorrow is expected to consider the note of the Allies to Germany regarding the latter's disarmament under the Versailles peace treaty. Opinion here is that the note will be sent to Germany some time next week.

ANSWERS "YES"

The reparations commission considered all documents dealing with the execution of the Dawes plan up until May 1. It had a letter, dated May 27, from the Council of Ambassadors, asking, "Up to the present has Germany acquiesced faithfully in the obligations for reparations as fixed under the Dawes plan?"

The commission, after a short exchange of views of its members, replied: "The answer is in the affirmative."

CONFIRMS REPORT OF SHIPPING DEAL

Moore and McCormick Negotiating For Control of Levant and Five Others.

NEW YORK, May 29.—Returning from Washington, where he said he conferred with Shipping Board officials, Emmett J. McCormick, treasurer of Moore & McCormick, shipping operators, last night confirmed reports that he is negotiating for control of the Levantian and five other passenger liners operated by the United States lines for the Shipping Board.

Mr. McCormick said that because of the fact that his firm operates 55 vessels the overhead of the ships for which he is negotiating could be reduced and, he believes, the present deficit could be wiped out.
