WILLIAM SENTENCED

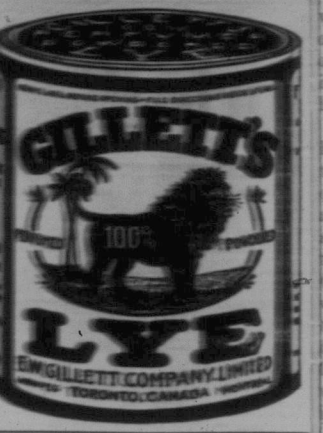

assembly that he would not object if the committee decided to raise the figure to \$3, as he was not sure that \$2.50 a day was sufficient to meet rising costs.

In reply to a question asked by Mr. Nolin, of Athabasca, about the quantity of stock sold to farmers under the Livestock Purchase and Sale act in 1919 Hon. C. A. Dunning gave the following figures: Since May, 1919, up to the present the department of agriculture has sold 128 pure bred bulls, 1,568 grade heifers and cows, 80 pure bred rams, 36 pure bred ewes and 2,428 grade ewes.

while a market exists the high cost of transportation and congestion of ocean transport make it practically impossible to export Saskatchewan horses to Europe at present.

The bill to amend the Succession Day act was considered in committee of the whole. A basic rate of duties to be paid on estates, the amounts being dependent on the aggregate amount of the estate left to beneficiaries as set out in the act. Other scales of excessive varying with the amounts and dependent on the degree of consanguinity of the beneficiary to the deceased or without the province are provided in the bill.

The basic scale is as follows:

Where the aggregate value of the estate ranges from:

- \$10,000 to \$25,000, 1% per cent;
- \$25,000 to \$50,000, 1 1/2% per cent;
- \$50,000 to \$75,000, 2% per cent;
- \$75,000 to \$100,000, 3% per cent;
- \$100,000 to \$150,000, 4% per cent;
- \$150,000 to \$200,000, 5% per cent;
- \$200,000 to \$400,000, 6% per cent;
- \$400,000 to \$600,000, 7% per cent;
- \$600,000 to \$800,000, 8% per cent;
- \$800,000 to \$1,000,000, 8 1/2% per cent;
- \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000, 9% per cent;
- over \$1,500,000, 10% per cent.

In order to enable farmers in the drought affected area to sell as profitably as possible young cows and heifers which they were unable to carry, the department of agriculture arranged that a purchasing agent of the livestock branch would visit central points in the district affected to buy any suitable cattle offered for sale and the stock thus purchased was sold to farmers in parts of the province where feed was more plentiful, thus resulting in stabilizing of prices as well as supplying suitable stock for farmers with sufficient feed.

Mr. Dunning, in reply to a question by Mr. Dooks, told what steps had been taken by the government to find a market for the surplus of horses at present on farms in the province. A conference was held in Ottawa last spring attended by a representative of the Saskatchewan department of agriculture, to investigate the possibilities of marketing horses in Europe and E. Postmans, formerly of Belgium, but now a resident of Saskatchewan, was commissioned by the provincial minister of agriculture to ascertain the conditions of the European market. It was found that

Mr. Turgoo pointed out that under the provisions of the bill the first \$10,000 is free where the wife or children were the beneficiaries. The bill, he stated, stresses the main point that of the majority of the other provinces in the Dominion. The bill was left in committee.

Some new clauses have been inserted in the act respecting Board and Wardens, permitting the municipality to disclaim on the chattels of the owner of impounded stock where the costs of sale are in excess of the proceeds and where they are no bidders at the sale of the impounded animal, the animal may become the property of the municipality upon application to a justice of the peace within 10 days after the sale of the animal.

The bill was left in committee.

The following bills introduced by the Hon. Mr. Dunning, were given a first reading: Respecting the manufacture of dairy products and respecting an amendment to the factories act.

Mr. Dunning, in reply to Mr. McCreary (Happyland), said that credit advanced by the government for seed and feed relief in local improvement districts in southern Saskatchewan in 1919. Credit was given to 247 applicants for a total of 10,494 bushels of wheat, 10,822 bushels of seed oats and 15,554 bushels of feed oats. Seed loans were registered against the land and

Since the opening of the session were answered and several bills were dealt with in various stages of their career.

At 4 o'clock, his honor the lieutenant-governor, accompanied by Capt. Allard, A.D.C., visited the assembly and formally gave the royal assent to the measures already adopted.

A motion of T. H. Garry, Yorkton, asking the government to bring down legislation requiring automobile selling companies to keep a stock of repairs in the province, was carried unanimously, and it is expected a bill will be introduced after the Christmas vacation. Suggestions were made that the legislation should also give the government control of prices for repair parts and require companies ceasing to manufacture and sell autos to protect their purchasers for a period of years thereafter.

During the morning the private bills committee met and considered the bill to incorporate the Herbert Union Weissenart.

While the committee was of the opinion that the Menonite trustees were doing a commendable work of a purely charitable nature as provided in the bill, it was felt that the trust privileges which it was proposed to confer upon the organization were too wide and it was decided to limit these privileges. The bill as amended was reported to the assembly.

ASSOCIATION APPEALS TO FOREIGNERS

A Bayton of Carlton, Director of District No. 12, has forwarded to the Central Office the following interesting report of Grain Growers' Association activities in the Northern portion of the Province.

New Local at Duck Lake.

Duck Lake Local was organized on 22nd inst. Fourteen members to start, which will probably reach fifty before the end of the year. The Secretary will send you copy of minutes and in the meantime names of the officers are here-with: President, G. Gervais; Vice President, P. Lemanuel; Secretary, Ambrose Barre; Directors in addition to foregoing, Dr. Perrillat, R. Bonnet. All addresses, Duck Lake, Sask.

This is a French Local. M. M. Robin, our President at Carlton, took the burden of the work at the meeting, addressing them in French. Many can understand English, some can read it, but many cannot do either. This is particularly true of the women. It is an old-country French settlement with a half-breed mixture (we shall get few members from the latter), well-to-do and progressive. Of course they are strongly Laurier Liberal.

"Mr. Barre" (the "e" is accented) is very intelligent, reads English but doesn't write it without difficulty. Will it be possible to conduct correspondence with him in French? To advertise the meeting, I used our Posters and sent to each farmer a copy of the Farmers' Platform and the Romance of the S.G.G.A. both in French where advisable. The Pamphlets were appreciated. I am of the opinion that when we have our organization extended to all the corners it will be desirable to have even our monthly market statements printed in languages other than English.

Interesting Young People.

"M. M. Robin is our delegate to the Co-operative Elevator Co. annual meeting and he may be in to see you. We tried to put him on our list of Sub-organizers particularly for work among the French people but he thought it impossible. I am sure he will be able to help me at some other point later on and any encouragement you give him will help. His work as President at Carlton has been the making of him and he is getting to be really useful. He came home

from the District Convention at Prince Albert full of the idea that we must do something worth while for our young people and has since organized a Young People's department of our Local. Twenty seven members, I believe, right off the bat. They pay a two dollar fee which makes them members of the Local and secures them a button.

Except the \$1.00 sent to Central they have the spending of their own money. They are putting on very interesting programs. More of this movement later.

"Duck Lake adopted a \$2.00 fee which includes a button. I handed Mr. Barre a 25 button box from the supply you sent me from Prince Albert and the new members went away decorated, and happy. Our young people at Carlton have their own officers and I have given them a similar box.

Planning Big Campaign.

District No. 12 is out for the biggest organization campaign in its history — necessitated by the political movement requirements. I am sure the end of the year will find us with a fine list of new locals asking for the courtesy of representation therat. It will take plenty of time and work but we have a goodly number of sub-organizers available now and they are thoroughly seized of the fact that our political organization is dependent on the association's activities.

"I advised Duck Lake to be a 1919 local so as to get in immediate touch with Central and explained that Central would not expect the payment of 1920 fees until time for the District Convention, and they concurred.

"The townspeople of Duck Lake did not attend the meeting, probably because my posters said 'farmers'; but I am sure many of them will wish to join. It is better for the farmers to take petitions of responsibility and get somewhat acquainted with the work before others enter.
