ADVISES NEWFOUNDLAND TO ACCEPT THE TERMS

Treaty With United States Being Considered by the Island Government.

ST. JOHN, Nfld., Jan. 26.—The cabinet was in session tonight considering the terms of the proposed fisheries agreement between the United States and Great Britain. The government newspaper organ here says that the questions at issue have not been finally agreed upon.

A long cipher message containing the terms as arranged at Washington was received from London late today. Upon its receipt a meeting of the cabinet was called.

LONDON, Jan. 27.—The Times, in an editorial, urges the Newfoundlanders to accept the arrangement made in Washington in the fisheries dispute. It says:

"It can hardly hope to reopen the negotiations at some future date with better support than they have now, and they had recognized, like the greatest powers, that they can only safeguard their own interests by some concession to conflicting interests."

Witnessed by about five hundred interested spectators, the hockey match in the Queens Rink last evening proved a victory for the Charlottetown players over the all-St. John septette by a score of two to one. The match was undoubtedly the fastest seen here in recent years, each team playing a remarkable game. When the teams last met and the St. John boys won out, the game was a fast one, but last night considerable improvement was shown on both sides.

It was a hockey match from start to finish, and while the Island team won out they had no easy time, as the locals had them on the run at many stages of the game.

Local enthusiasts were agreeably surprised at the quality of hockey played by the teams, especially that of the Charlottetown players, who were also surprised to see the line-up of the visitors. Murphy of the New Glasgow team was on hand, and played very well. He showed himself to be a fast man with the stick and a good all-around player.

For the locals played in the usual good form, while Tully, Paterson, Clawson, McAvilly and Kennedy also showed up to good advantage. Both goal tenders were especially good, Barton having many hard shots to stop, Campbell for the visitors proved himself the stone wall of the team. He stopped all sorts and conditions of shots.

Twenty-five minute halves were played. The game opened with a rush on the part of St. John. They secured the first tally after about ten minutes of play. Throughout the half splendid individual work was shown, although no further scoring was done by either team.

The visitors netted both goals in the second half, which was slightly in their favor, although the locals played well. In this half, Murphy met with a slight mishap, causing a delay which was unfavorable to the Charlottetown team. The game could not be called a rough one, although for about five minutes there was considerable mixing up.

LECTURE PROVES MOST ENJOYABLE

There was a large attendance at the rooms of the Natural History Society last evening to hear a lecture delivered by Professor W. W. Andrews. The lecturer delivered a splendid address, which was greatly appreciated.
