

TWO WEEKS LATER FROM CALIFORNIA!

The steamship *Prometheus*, from San Juan, arrived at New York on Saturday evening, with San Francisco dates to the 10th September.

The steamer *Lafayette* on her first trip from New York to China was totally destroyed by fire at the British port of Foochow on the 1st September. The *Beaumont* had to have proceeded

but their crews and the doctors on the *Lafayette* were safe.

The news from the mines continues favorable,

but the market price has fallen.

Interest on account of the electric telegraph is rapidly increasing up, and the miners are about laying in stores preparatory to the rainy season, which is thought to be near at hand.

sed by the Governor, was safely executed by

denounced the anti-slavery doctrines of our

"All Wheress," this Province has already been

also two men named McKenzie and Whitaker

have been executed. Two others have been

executed in Sacramento, since which perfect

quiet has been restored.

The greatest excitement had attended the case

of the *Wilmette* and *Wilmette*. They were ar-

rested at this instance of the Vigilance Commit-

tee and kept in custody, having confined to a

number of flaring robes. On the morning of the 21st of August, before daylight the city authorities proceeded to the rooms of the Com-
mittee and took the *Wilmette* and *Whitaker* to the jail. When the populace were informed of this act, the wildest excitement was manifested, and soon on Sunday afternoon, shortly after two o'clock, the prisoners were forcibly removed from the jail, and carried to the office of the Committee, and in an incredible short space of time the instruments of execution were adjusted, and they were launched into eternity, amidst a shout of justification from the crowd. All the vigilantes who were present, except Mr. McKenzie being pronounced dead by his physician in attendance, he was again hoisted into the air; till life was extinct—when the crowd dispersed quietly and order was restored. Some shots were fired at the rescue, but nothing serious.

brought about five miles from Sacramento, +
