GIANTS WON THE NEW YORK SERIES

With Mathewson in the Box They Defeated the Highlanders Yesterday -- Home Run by Doyle a Feature.

New York, Oct. 21.—With Chris Mathewson in the box the New York National league won the 1910 baseball championship of Manhattan today by defeating the American league team six to three, thereby taking four out of seven games. POOR OUTLOOK FOR BALL GAME

Feared Last Night That Rain Would Again Cause Postponement of Philadelphia-Chicago Contest Today.

Chicago, Oct. 21.—A possible postponement of the fourth game between the American and the National league baseball champions in the world's series was discussed tonight, when the weather bureau issued a bulletin predicting rain tomorrow. "Showers Saturday morning, continued cool," was the official weather forecast received with gloom at both the Chicago and the Philadelphia headquarters. Officials and others who examined the condition of the grounds at the west side ball park tonight, declared that a heavy shower tomorrow morning would compel another postponement of the fourth game which was to have been played today.

The discouraging weather outlook was the only subject discussed by gatherings of baseball enthusiasts at various hotels, theatres and restaurants tonight. Followers of the Philadelphia team in particular were displaying impatience with the situation. They took today's postponement with no great display of philosophy, when told of the possibility of a second postponement some of them started for home.

Partisans of the Chicago team, however, generally regarded today's postponement as a good omen. Many of them declare the break in the series of games will prove the charm that they think will break Chicago's losing streak.

YACHT SEASON CLOSES OCT. 31

Flag on R. K. C. Y. Club House Will be Lowered on That Day With Appropriate Ceremony—Annual Meeting Nov 1

The river at Millidgeville is rapidly assuming a deserted appearance as the yachts are being put into winter quarters. Some boats are now hauled up and the rest are being stripped. Only two or three of the sail craft remain in commission, and these will have their last sail today.

The official closing of the season will be Monday, October 31st, when the ensign will be hauled down from the clubhouse with appropriate ceremony and a salute fired. The past season has been a most successful one in every way, and the yachtmen have a large fund of pleasant reminiscences for discussion during the winter.

The regular quarterly meeting of the R. K. C. Y. C. will be held Tuesday, November 1st. At this meeting the prizes for the season's races will be presented. As there were four sailing and five motor boat races, the presentation of prizes is quite an event. In the motor boat race to Fredericton every one of the 21 boats that finished will receive a pennant. These pennants are in addition to the prizes to the winners.

It is probable that the question of a one design class of sailing boats will be considered. One design classes have been adopted by the majority of clubs, and have in every case added to the interest in racing.

The holding of a regatta next summer will probably be discussed also and with a large number of visiting yachts should afford an interesting programme for three or four days.

HARVARD AND BROWN TODAY

Two of Big College Teams Will Clash on Gridiron -- Wearers of Crimson Confident of Victory.

Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 31.—Harvard's football team today completed its final preparations for meeting Brown in the stadium tomorrow afternoon by running through light signal drill. Confidence was expressed that the crimson would win by a comfortable margin, although Brown was expected to give its usual hard fight. The showing of the Providence team against Pennsylvania last week, when the Bronanians lost 20 to 0 did not cause the Harvard coaches to become over confident. The Brown line is almost as heavy as Harvard's and instructing him to continue in the management of the business until further orders. It was also decided to call for tenders for the sale of the property as a going concern, selling the plant, buildings, good-will and leases.
