ICE IN THE GULF HOLDS LINERS OUT

The steamer Sicilian Unable to Reach Quebec will Land 1000 Passengers at Halifax—Others in Same Box.

Halifax, April 26.—Owing to the amount of ice still in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, several of the steamers bound to Quebec and Montreal will likely have to come to Halifax to land passengers. The Sicilian, which sailed from Glasgow on April 16 has found it impossible to reach Quebec. Yesterday Friday City Co. received the following telegram from Montreal: "Sicilian report cargo packed ice with no opening, proceeding to Halifax to land passengers. Arrange." No word has been received as to the time the Sicilian will arrive here, but will likely arrive today. She has 970 passengers all of whom will be landed here. She also has cargo, but this will not be landed here, as the steamer will wait here until a favorable report has been received and when proceed to Montreal.

The Royal line steamer Royal George was off Cape Race on Monday and was expected to reach Quebec this morning, but it had not been received here as to whether or not she was able to get up the Gulf. The conditions as reported by the Sicilian will also retard any other steamers now in that vicinity.
