CANADIAN CASUALTIES UP TO YESTERDAY, 9.042

Lists Issued Yesterday by Militia Department Contain Names of Four New Brunswick Men.

Ottawa, June 26—The casualties among the Canadians at the front now total almost 10,000, exclusive of those actually reported as prisoners of war. Up to today there are 1,484 reported killed, 5,947 wounded and 1,611 missing. Total 9,042.

The lists issued today are lengthy ones. The following are the names of Maritime Province men taken from the list of casualties issued by the war office last night. It will be noted that one of the names, that of Lieut. McFarlane is Stephen, N. B., is from the 26th Battalion. Lieut. McFarlane is reported as "dangerously iil." The others mentioned are:

Berlin, June 26 .- Via Paris-The official communication issued today by the German army headquarters staff was as follows:

"In the western theatre:
"Close range fighting which had
proceeded uninterestedly for
some days around the portion of our positions which remained in the hands of the enemy north of Souchez, and half way between Souchez and Neuville, has come to an end. During the night the last of the French soldiers were driven out of our trenches. So criven out or our trenches. So recently as yesterday evening the enemy received strong reinforcements at this point, as they also did on both sides of the Lorrett hills. As they advanced to attack south of Souchez, they were driven off.

"In the Champagne, near Soulain, we blew up a portion of an enemy position. East of Perthes the French accidentally destroyed by a mine some of their own defensive works. On both sides of Detranches road the enemy brought up troops fdur deep over a front of three kilometres, ready for an attack. They everywhere broke up under our fire. Where the enemy pressed forward into our trenches he was beaten off with heavy losses, and driven back in the fray which followed in an attack made by us afterwards we captured an enemy advance position east of Detranches. In this district the enemy still holds a small part of a trench which he captured on June 20.

"Attacks made by advance patrols of the enemy near Leintry, east of Luneville, failed.

"Since the commencement of the great struggle near Arras our airmen have been struggling with those of the enemy for mastery in the air. This struggle has caused losses on both sides, but ours have not been in vain. For some days we apparently have had the upper hand.

"In the eastern theatre:

"A Wurtemburger regiment stormed the eastern positions southeast of Oglenda, north of Prassmysk and on both sides of the Kurowka, and held the positions taken against several counter-attacks, even against those made at night. The booty amounted to 636 prisoners and four ma-

ed to 636 prisoners and four machine guns.
"In the southeastern theatre:
"The army of Gen. Von Linsingen is continuing its attacks on the northern bank of the River Dniester. The right bank near Halicz still is held by the enemy. Since the beginning of their attack on this river, on June 23rd, they have taken 3,500 prisoners.
"Between the Dniester and the district east of Lemberg fighting continues."

WILL INTRODUCE BILL PROVIDING FOR A NATIONAL REGISTER

FRENCH SOLDIER, TWICE BURIED ALIVE, RETURNS



London, June 27—Hon. Walter Long will introduce his bill providing for a national register, under the tenminutes rule of the Commons on Tuesday. The object of the bill is to enable the government to ascertain the names of those still available for enlistment, or qualified to make munitions, or to perform other war work, such as filling the shortage in agricultural labor and other food supplies industries.

The register will be taken on the same lines as the census by the register-general, and when it is completed the central and local bureaus will possess complete lists of menavailable for the army or for war work. Such as volunteer will be called as they are required, while should compulsion be required then the lists of industry paying high wages, is so great that domestic servants are becoming sammunition, or in other forms.
