A. J. H. STEWART, FORMER
M. L. A., PASSES AWAY

Represented Gloucester Co. in
Legislature for Several
Years—Had Been in Ill
Health for Long Time.

Bathurst, April 30.—A. J. H. Stewart, who was one of the representatives for Gloucester County in the late legislature, died here this evening after a lengthy illness. Mr. Stewart was a son of the late Dugald Stewart of Dalhousie and was fifty seven years of age.

He was born in Dalhousie, but has been in business here, being secretary of the Gloucester Lumber and Trading Co., Ltd. He was twice married, but both his wives are dead and he leaves no immediate family.

He is survived by four brothers, Charles of Dalhousie; James E. of Dalhousie, who is sheriff of Beauséjour County; Matthew of California and Robert of Prince Edward Island.

One sister, Mrs. William Mott of Campbellton, also survives. The late Mr. Stewart was a prominent member of the Masonic body and was past grand master of St. John Lodge, of Bathurst. The funeral will be held at 2 p. m., Wednesday.

FRANCE WANTS
U. S. FLAG ON
BATTLE LINE

Washington, April 30.—Marshal Joffre told the people of America today, through Washington newspaper correspondents who called upon him, that France cherishes the confident hope that the flag of the United States soon will be flying on her battle line.

Victories sure to be won by the soldiers of the two republics, once more fighting shoulder to shoulder for liberty, declared the hero of the Marne, will hasten the end of the war and tighten the links of affection and esteem which have ever united France and the United States.

It was just before the marshal and other members of the French war mission started for a visit to the tomb of George Washington at Mount Vernon that the correspondents were received by the marshal.

"Led by its illustrious president, the United States has entered into this war. By the side of France in the defense of the ideals of mankind, in the place of America is marked."

"France, which has long recognized the valor of the American soldier, cherishes the confident hope that the flag of the United States will soon be unfurled on our fighting line. This is what Germany dreams."
