

ANOTHER "STUCK PIG" DOES CONSIDERABLE SQUEALING

The Grain Growers' Guide Deprived by the Manufacturers of Certain Advertising Advises Its Readers to Boycott All Firms Which Do Not Patronize Its Columns—As Usual With it, the Interests of the Western Farmers Are Put First, the Interests of Eastern Men Are of No Account.

(Maritime Farmer.) Recent issues of the Grain Growers' Guide, the parent of the United Farmers' Guide of Montreal, have been including in its columns advertisements for certain firms which do not patronize its columns. It has been systematically depriving the advertising of Canadian manufacturers, whom it divides into two groups, "those who do not patronize the Guide," meaning those who patronize the Guide, and the "Divine Right Protectionists," ill-starred fellows, who do not pay money into the coffers of the paper.

It calls for a remedy. The suggestion is that no western farmer buy goods unless he sees them advertised in the Guide. Of course those advertised in that paper may not be the best, but he is not to worry over that. The reward is to be in the knowledge that money is being paid into the treasury of the Guide, which in turn will pay Mr. Chipman's salary and according to that gentleman will be devoted to propaganda work among the farmers of Canada, and among other things we suppose, help pay the salaries of the representatives of the Grain Growers of the west, who are at present busy in the Maritime Provinces working up an organization, which the Maritime Farmer again asserts will be used for the advantage of the grain grower. So at least the Guide is frank to the source of the funds which it has been spending so lavishly in these parts. They have been supplied by the manufacturers of Canada, through the Guide's advertising columns.

The Western Farmers. Let its own words be taken down, as submitted by its editor, Mr. George F. Chipman, in its issue of February 25th. After quoting its revenue for the months of December and January it says:

"It will readily be seen that advertising revenue is necessary, in order to make the Grain Growers' Guide a successful publication, able to carry on its work in support of the policy of the organized farmers of Western Canada." You will note the policy of the Grain Growers of Western Canada. Just what the Maritime Farmer has contended the Guide and its representatives have been doing. You see it speaks freely in the west for western consumption. Its Montreal child will no doubt look after Eastern farmers under the skilled direction of the same Mr. Chipman.

But the Guide does not stop there. It claims to be persons of what it says has been handed out to it, and so it invites farmers to buy as suggested above and lays down the rules for their guidance, (March 17th issue):

- 1.—Make it a practice when reading the Guide to inspect the advertising pages also, and see what announcements they contain of interest to you.
- 2.—When you are buying any advertised products as far as possible buy those advertised in the Guide.
- 3.—When you answer an advertisement say that you saw it in the Grain Growers' Guide.
- 4.—When you wish to purchase some advertised product that is not advertised in the Guide, write of your letter to the firm and point out the value of the Guide as an advertising medium and the reason why you support the Guide and its policy. Tell your local dealer the same.
- 5.—If you find any advertiser in the Guide who does not give a square deal notify The Guide immediately, giving all the facts.

These rules will maintain the organization where their own present position ways be free to fight their battles without fear or favor. It will also enable The Guide to publish more frequently than once a week.

It is the purpose of The Guide to publish an up-to-date list of its advertisers from time to time for the assistance of its readers.

Note.—This list of advertisers on this page is made up to include only the issue of March 10. There are some advertisers in this issue not on the list. These will be included in the next list.

That Apparently is an Innocent Suggestion. Let us examine it. In the first place these "Divine Rightists" to which the Guide refers are men who are engaged in manufacturing in this country. They have been denounced, time and again by the Grain Growers' Guide, as defrauders of legislatures, robbers of corruption funds, robbers of the farmers.

Better Prices Hoped For.

The Maritime Farmer had hoped that the great war would result in better things, so far as the public life of this country is concerned. Thousands of men and women proved that such might be. In order to win for the world something higher and better than "might is right" and "the end justifies the means," thousands of boys left the farms of the Maritime Provinces, passed through the horrors of the European nightmare, and many of these boys, the best we had, gave their lives for liberty, justice and righteousness. We ask in the light of Mr. Chipman's suggestion if it does not look as if the struggle had not brought to us that which we most desired. What public man there is in Canada who would attempt to blackmail the manufacturers as Mr. George F. Chipman, editor of the Grain Growers' Guide and managing editor of the United Farmers' Guide, has dared to blackmail them. What other man there who would invite farmers to sit down at a table with men of Agriculture, whose mottoes are "debauchery" and "the end justifies the means," and who would suppose that before he de- cluded to enter upon such a campaign, Mr. Chipman would have weighed the sordidness of his proposition.

May we ask the wives of the farmers of the Maritime Provinces if they desire their boys and girls to be brought to believe that money is money, to be taken by any means from any source and used for any purpose? Do they believe that such doctrines and such principles are calculated to improve the country of boys' surroundings or the country of which their boys will be the directors? Do these mothers believe that the boys should be taught to use funds which they regard as stolen, to get them at the point of the pistol? And further, do these mothers believe that the boys of this land should be taught to not only take such tainted money, but be taught to invite their comrades to share in the takings?

A Disreputable Proposal. The Maritime Farmer is not wealthy. It does refuse hundreds of dollars worth of advertising every year. If the Maritime Farmer does not think there is not money enough in this country for the owner of this paper to publish advertisements of the class, which Mr. Chipman says must have and is going to have, if this paper is forced for the sake of money to accept advertising from men who are reputed to be robbers of farmers, we'll put up the shutters and get something of an honest turn to do. Let the Maritime Farmer say that in its judgment, the proposal of Mr. Chipman is disreputable and utterly lacking in elementary decency. Mr. Chipman intimates that there are no other alternatives. But why not allow Mr. Chipman to sell himself and not include the farmers of this country in the price package? Unlike Mr. Chipman, the Maritime Farmer believes there are farmers in this country who will hardly condone any such arrangement where they are to be bled white for the benefit of any paper of any class. There is a limit to the number of opinions of this paper Mr. George F. Chipman stands out pre-eminent as the proponent of a policy which for pure and undisturbed efficiency eclipses anything heretofore heard of.

May we be permitted to add that these very men who cause the manufacturers of this country to use them in the next, are moving heaven and earth to injure the Maritime Farmer. Yet they put up an awful "holier" when they are asked to use their own medicine. Let us say in all seriousness that if any person does want to do business with the Maritime Farmer, that is the business of the person concerned and we shall neither threaten or resort to blackmail of his country.

The manufacturers of this country are not what the Canadian Council of Agriculture would have the farmers of this country believe them to be. They have their faults, as we all have, but they may be pardoned if they refuse to submit to such despicable attacks as those which have been directed towards them by such men as Mr. Chipman.

May we ask in conclusion if Hon. Mr. Crerar is cognate with the blackmailing program of Mr. Chipman, and whether he approves of it. Does Mr. Crerar agree that money should be forced from the funds of Agriculture to be used in support of the Grain Growers' Guide, to be subsidised by the Government? (The Guide's own words) "in support of the policy of the organized farmers of western Canada?" Mr. Crerar must answer. He is now the leader of a political party in this country and his chief political organ has placed him in a rather awkward position.

The country to the Maritime Farmer are open to Mr. Crerar.

STATE OF NEVADA TO PRESS DIVORCE SUIT Counsel for Douglas Fairbanks Trying Hard for Stay of Proceedings.

Los Angeles, Calif., April 13.—The suit of the State of Nevada to void the decree of divorce granted Mary Pickford from Owen Moore a short time prior to her marriage to Douglas Fairbanks, will be heard in the district court at Minden, Nevada, next Thursday, by Attorney-General Fowler, who is personally preparing the papers.

Extraordinary efforts have been made to induce the Attorney-General to drop the case. The Governor has been asked not only from Southern California, but by New York, Boston, Chicago and other cities.

The latest effort to have the suit dropped was made by Mary Pickford, an attorney of San Francisco, who was retained by Douglas Fairbanks for permission to assemble the law firm of C. F. O'Connor and to present them to him personally before court action was taken. This was denied by Mr. Fowler.
