AROUND THE CITY

HEAVY SNOW DRIFTS. Reports from country districts are to the effect that the snow had drifted very high during the night...

CITY HALL ELEVATOR. The elevator for the city hall has been shipped and workmen from the A. H. Williams Elevator Company will commence this week cutting away the stairway to provide space.

CAUSED A RUNAWAY. About noon yesterday a snowball, thrown by a boy struck a horse owned by the Van Oosterhout family on Water street, and was the cause of the horse running away. The sign attached was broken before the horse was stopped near the corner of Cliff street.

EMPLOYMENT OFFICE. Yesterday morning nine men registered at the St. John Registration and Employment Office. Five applications for work were received, one coming from Campbells seeking for a woman. Four permanent positions for men to work in the shops were filled yesterday; also three temporary two men and one for a woman.

DEPT. OF PUBLIC WORKS. The work of removing ice and snow from the city streets yesterday provided work for thirty teams and a large crew of men. A start has been made in hauling stone from Millidge avenue to Newmarket bridge, giving employment to ten men. The work on the steamroad grounds gives work to twenty-seven men. In the emergency work at Nelson's wharf, five men were engaged in unloading in the pit which have been driven and more men will be put to work next week.

COMMON COUNCIL CONSIDERED ESTIMATES FOR 1922 YESTERDAY

Those of Water and Sewerage and Public Works Departments Submitted—Appropriations of Public Works Calls for \$29,640.23 Increase—Water and Sewerage Increase is \$30,137.14.

The appropriations for 1922 of the Public Works Department and of the Water and Sewerage Department, were submitted to the common council and considered in committee of the whole yesterday afternoon.

The Public Works Department called for \$29,640.23, an increase of \$29,640.23 over last year, due to interest charges on the existing street paving and other work undertaken during the last year.

Water and Sewerage called for \$30,137.14, an increase of \$30,137.14 due to interest charges on the new spruce tank main.

Commissioner Thorne was unable to be present at yesterday's meeting because of sickness. This report of the committee of the whole as already published was adopted.

Commissioner Bullock then brought up the matter of unexpended balances and expressed himself in favor of a return to the previous financial position in 1921, that of a unimpaired year for all expenditures calling for bond issues.

Commissioner Frank said there was only one way to deal with the matter, and that was to complete the work and then ask for a bond issue. He said it was not always possible to know what the costs would be, as in the case of paving of Prince Edward street, the cost of asphalt, gravel and sand, etc. had fallen after the work was begun and it had been done at a smaller cost than was first anticipated.

Report of Conference. The report of a conference between the city engineer, the C. P. R. engineers, and a representative of the Railway Commission, was submitted to the council by C. G. Hays, city engineer. He reported that he had in mind the possibility that a permanent structure of the proposed concrete bridge would be the most acceptable to the city. That the city was willing to accept whatever design the C. P. R. should care to submit, and that if the C. P. R. did not care to do so, the plans should be secured from the architect who designed similar structures for the city of Halifax.

Commissioner Frank drew attention to the fact that the approach to the proposed overhead crossing from Douglas avenue would be one of 12 per cent. His motion that the city engineer, road engineer and Commissioner of Public Works be called upon to submit a report, suggesting any possible improvement on this grade, was carried.

Commissioner Bullock moved that notice be given to such of the corporation's tenants as he deemed necessary. Carried.

Considered Estimates. The Council then went into the committee of the whole to consider estimates. Commissioner Frank submitted his schedule of appropriations for 1922, which were discussed item by item.

Public Works Appropriation for 1922. Street maintenance—Appropriation, \$12,800; cut, \$7,000. Public squares—\$10,000; increase, \$1,000. Street plant—\$11,200; cut, \$1,000. New asphalt pavements—\$5,000; same as last year. Transport garage—\$3,000. Buildings—\$9,285.25; same as last year. Civic rent, City Hall—\$100; road charges.

What is Wanted. This commissioner said he had made provision for the opening of a two and a half mile City Hall road, similar to the one now used by the department, and which had been found to be the most satisfactory in every respect. He also wanted a new street light system for the street lighting at a cost of \$4,000. He also wanted an extra, which would save an enormous amount of interest money.

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Fire Department Was Kept Busy

Answered to Three Alarms Yesterday—Fred Doig's Printing Shop Badly Damaged.

The fire department was called out on three occasions yesterday, but fortunately only one fire caused any great amount of damage and that was in the printing establishment conducted by Fred Doig on Cornhill street.

Trains moving the north and south of the department were called out by an alarm from box 131 for a fire in the home of James Bouras, 111½ Cornhill street. This fire was caused by a defective fuse and by the quick work of the firemen the damage caused was slight.

About five o'clock an alarm was sent in from box 133 on Hill street, near the Union Depot for a fire in a C. P. R. box car on one of the sidings. The blaze was of little consequence and was soon extinguished by the firemen.

The most serious of the fires yesterday was in the printing shop of Fred Doig on the third floor at 55 Cornhill street. When the fire broke out, it was in a room where a quantity of paper and a steam boiler were burning brightly and a stream of water was taken upstairs and played upon the blaze extinguishing it in a short time. No great damage was done to printing apparatus, but a considerable quantity of paper and other material used in Mr. Doig's business were destroyed.

The fire started presumably from a defective gas burner. It was from the wire caught on a roll of paper just inside the printing room door. In addition to the damage caused by the fire, there was a certain amount of damage done by water.
