"Slim" never spent any time at Dundas Harbour as that detachment was closed in 1933 and I don't know if it was later reactivated. In 1934, the Hudson's Bay Co. moved some Eskimo families to Devon Island to trap foxes and rented the police buildings for use as a trading post. I believe they only stayed there a year or two.
