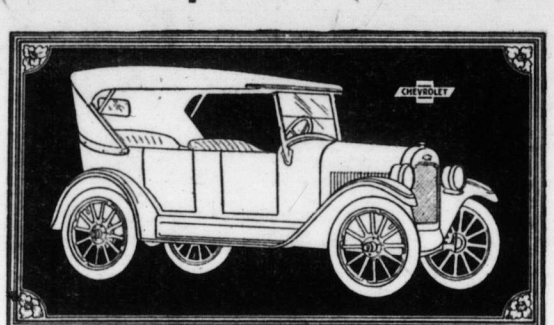

Lethbridge Renominated

At the U.F.O. convention at Mount Brydges yesterday J. G. Lethbridge, M. P. P., was again chosen candidate for the West Riding of Middlesex for the Legislature, securing 5 votes to 1.

DISTRICT AND GENERAL

About 60 radio licenses were issued at the Sarnia post office during April. Exeter Oddfellows Lodge has a membership of 171, with 45 past grants, and has over \$17,000 in the treasury.

Duncan Mann, of West Lorne, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Merrifield, in Detroit, May 5th, in his 85th year.

Harold Curry, of Adelaide, has been chosen to bear the U.F.O. standard in North Middlesex in the forthcoming provincial election.

Wm. Gallagher, of Canadac, has been appointed returning officer for West Middlesex in the provincial general elections on June 25.

The death occurred in Canadac on May 2 of William James Bolton, eldest son of Charles H. Bolton, in his 31st year. Death was due to blood poisoning from carbuncles.

Mr. and Mrs. Herman Bowby and family, of Saskatoon, are returning to their former home at Napier. Mr. Bowby and Arthur Field have bought the old Calvert store there.

Wardville W. M. S. met recently, when reports of the year's work were given by the different heads of departments. The total missionary funds given by the auxiliary circle and band amounted to more than \$200.

John B. McGugan of Toronto, has set aside \$50 a year for five consecutive years to be awarded as prizes to the four most successful competitors in a public oratorical contest for Alderborough township, where he formerly resided.

A grandson of the original "Uncle Tom," the famous central figure in the story of "Uncle Tom's Cabin," written by Harriet Beecher Stowe, died in Dresden a few days ago in the person of Harper Henson, aged 33 years.

Mrs. Margaret McPhedrain, a lifelong resident of Dunwich township, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. L. W. Oke, at Alvinston, May 10th. Interment was made in the Murray cemetery, Ekfrid, on Saturday afternoon.

While searching through Knox Presbyterian church, London, where alterations are being made, Walter Gidley discovered a Bible printed in Gaelic 116 years ago. It is believed to have been the property of one of London's pioneers.

At a conference with officials of the immigration department at Washington, Secretary of Labor Davis reported that 62,000 Canadians have come to the United States within the last nine months. The head tax of \$8 has not been collected from all of them, he said.

A three-months winter course for farmers' sons who are in their fourteenth year is provided for in the Druy Government's amendments to the Adolescent School Attendance Act. This measure will be more appreciated than were the compulsory features of the act which preceded it.

The United States Department of Agriculture has found, from a survey of 10,000 farms, that in the last year the agricultural population decreases about half a billion. There is a shortage of 12 per cent. of farm labor. The same is true of Canada. Labor will not work on the farms at the price offered, when city wages are so much higher.

John L. Pearce, a prominent farmer of Dunwich township, passed away at his home at Wallacetown a few days ago. Mr. Pearce was born in 1837 on the farm on which he died. His parents came from Pennsylvania a number of years previously. Mr. Pearce was for many years secretary-treasurer of the Dunwich Insurance Company as well as treasurer of the Wallacetown fair.

The Johnson & Hyatt oil well at Arkona, which is down about 2,800 feet, and upon which nearly \$40,000 has been spent since it was begun in August, 1921, may be abandoned and a new hole drilled if efforts started three weeks ago to fish out a bar lodged in the bottom prove fruitless. The High Pressure Oil & Gas Co., which is supplying the funds, has increased its capital from \$40,000 to \$100,000.

A PIONEER REUNION

Four of the oldest pioneers of West Middlesex were the guests of Edway Hurdie, of Mosca, last Saturday on a motor trip through Mosca over territory associated with their pioneer days. They were Rothwell Winslip, aged 88, born in England and coming to Mosca in 1880; Alexander Laidlaw, aged 82, who came to Canada from Scotland in 1872, locating in London, but now residing in Mosca; Christopher Stocking, aged 84, who landed in Mosca about fifty years ago and is now living near Longwood Station, and William Jeffery, aged 81, born at St. Thomas and now residing in Newbury. The combined ages of these four pioneers is 335 years, and they are all enjoying fairly good health.

FIELD DAY AT APPIN

Stock Judging Competition and Afternoon of Sports

The junior farmers of Middlesex and Elgin are having a field day at Appin on May 24th. There will be a judging competition in the morning and sports in the afternoon, also a baseball game between the two counties. A silver cup is being donated by the pure bred live stock breeders of Elgin to the county winning the highest number of points; also a silver cup presented by Wm. Hollingshead, of Dutton, to the highest man of the day in judging; a medal by the manager of the Molsens Bank at Dutton to the highest man in sports, and a prize of \$2 by S. Lovell, merchant, Dutton, to the highest man in prize cattle. There will also be prizes to the three highest men in each county. All those wishing to compete will meet at Appin not later than 9 o'clock a.m.

Mr. McLean, manager of the Royal Bank at Appin, is giving \$2 to the high man in hogs; Chas. M. Macfie \$1 each to the second and third man in hog judging.

ELECTIONS JUNE 25

The Ontario Legislature was dissolved last week and the general elections fixed for Monday, June 25th, with nominations on Thursday, June 14th.

The fifteenth Parliament of Ontario, which this passes out of existence, was elected on October 20, 1919, and has held four sessions. When it rose on May 5th last, 55 were on the Government side of the chamber, 29 were among the Conservative benches and 27 were with the Liberals.

CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION

West Middlesex Liberal Conservatives will meet at Mount Brydges on Wednesday, May 23, at 2 o'clock, for the purpose of selecting a candidate to contest the riding in the coming provincial elections. Addresses will be given by E. R. Dennis, president of the Western District Conservative Association, and other prominent speakers.

GLENCOE BOY'S PROMOTION

Promotion of unusual distinction has come to T. R. Harrison, who for the past eighteen months has been in charge of the London, Ont., office of Wood, Gundy & Co., bond dealers. On June 1 he will leave for London, Eng., to assist in the management of the company's branch in the British metropolis. Mr. Harrison is a native of Glencoe, being a son of the late George M. Harrison, a private banker and clerk of the village for many years.

MOSA COUNCIL

A meeting of the Mosa council was held at Newbury on April 21. Members all present. The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and adopted.

Moved by James Gilbert, seconded by D. A. Mitchell, that the clerk be hereby authorized to sign an agreement between the Hydro-Electric Commission of Ontario and the township of Mosa so that hydro may be supplied to residents of the township. Carried.

Moved by J. A. Leitch, seconded by A. McCready, that A. E. Sutherland be paid \$12.25 for printing voters' lists. Carried.

Moved by D. A. Mitchell, seconded by J. A. Leitch, that the time set for the completion of government train No. 2 be extended to the first day of July, 1923. Carried.

Moved by A. McCready, seconded by D. A. Mitchell, that the council adjourn to meet at Glencoe on Saturday, May 26, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, as a court of revision on the assessment roll for 1923.

A WELCOME RAIN

A heavy rain early Tuesday morning and subsequent showers have spread a spirit of optimism over the country. Farmers had an exceptionally good season for putting in their crop, and good growth is now assured. The snow storm of last week it is not thought had been injurious, but on the contrary a great help to the grain crops in particular. A severe frost following the storm no doubt did considerable damage to the early fruit buds. Snow storms in the month of May are not unusual—in fact they often occur. Old residents say that on the 10th of May several years ago a foot or more of snow fell and remained on the ground for two or three days. At that time the maple trees were in full leaf and many of the fruit trees in bloom. The snow played havoc in the orchards, as the trees were unable to withstand its weight and many limbs were broken off.

CALLED TO MELBOURNE

Melbourne, May 11.—The congregations of Melbourne and Riverside Presbyterian churches held a meeting to make arrangements to call a minister. Four men had been heard. When the vote was taken, Rev. Mr. Oliver, of Alma, was the selection. Mr. Oliver comes very highly recommended, being a brother of Principal Oliver of a Presbyterian college in the West. Mr. Oliver received his high school education in Chatham, his home being eight miles from that place. Mrs. Oliver is a Ridgetown lady and a college graduate. We wish them every success in their new charge. Mr. Oliver was the first to preach here for a call after the pulpit was declared vacant by the moderator, Rev. Mr. Stevenson, of Appin.

London, May 15.—At a meeting of London Presbytery held here today a call from Melbourne and Riverside to Rev. Geo. W. Oliver, B.A., of Alma, Guelph Presbytery, was received. The call is signed by 81 members and 63 adherents. The stipend is \$1,800 and a manse. The call was supported by Messrs. Campbell and McGugan from Melbourne, and Messrs. Fletcher, Graham and Richards from Riverside. The call was sustained and sent forward to the Guelph Presbytery with the hope that Mr. Oliver will accept. The arrangements for the induction were left over. Mr. Stewart, of Dutton, will preach and Rev. W. G. Rose, the minister, and Mr. Stewart, of Dutton, the people. The people of Melbourne and Riverside were warmly congratulated on their fine liberality by the court.
