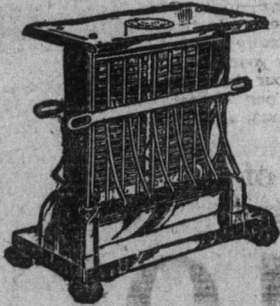

almost entirely upon the success of the present loan. The war finances of Canada, he declared, have reflected the greatest possible credit upon the people, and have placed the country in a position where she can face the future with courage and confidence. The New York markets and raise funds at more favorable rates than any other country. "It was because of the increased production in Canada that such conditions have been possible," he continued, "and it was the funds made available by previous Victory Loans which made it possible to dispose of those surplus products at a satisfactory figure."

But the Objective. The speaker went on to show how the 1918 Victory Loan had made it possible for Canada to extend credits to many kinds of European countries, for the purchase of Canadian products, and it was the industrial activity necessitated by the output of those products which had prevented a period of industrial stagnation after the signing of the armistice. An illustration Sir Thomas showed how \$50,000,000 had been advanced to Great Britain in the interests of the lumbering activities, how another \$700,000,000 had been advanced to insure the sale of Canada's surplus wheat and wheat products, while \$125,000,000 had been paid out to returned soldiers in the form of war gratuities. He pointed out that some \$225,000,000 is required to take care of the country's floating indebtedness alone. The balance of the loan, he stated, would be applied to credits and demobilization expenses.

From the investment standpoint, Sir Thomas found the loan to be one of the surprising things of the war, for, owing to the fact that previous loans had increased production to such an extent that the country had been able to carry war expenditures on increased production alone, Canada's securities still stand above par. He predicted that they would advance still more, and was particularly proud of the fact that the country came through the war with untarnished credit. While confident for the future, Sir Thomas pointed out that the only way in which future burdens can be met is by industry and thrift, and by that he meant industry for all. He wanted to discourage extravagance, fog, in his opinion, "ostentatious extravagance is a wicked thing."

Looking into the future Sir Thomas urged the Canadian people to set an example to the world in this period of reconstruction and he was confident they would. He pointed out the necessity of more people for this country with such vast undeveloped resources. He predicted a big flow of immigration to Canada.

After the address a vote of thanks moved and seconded by Mr. L. J. Breithaupt, city, and Mr. Thomas Hilliard of Waterloo, was passed and three cheers were given for the guest. The kindness and cordial reception were much appreciated by Sir Thomas.

The singing of the National Anthem concluded the program.
