Dr. George Johnson Dead.

George Johnson, D. C. L., M. A. Alton, and Dominion Statistician under both governments, passed away at his home in Grand Pre about noon the 17th inst., in the 73rd year of his age. His health was perfect up to the last of October. After the death of his life-long friend, A. McN. Patterson, on the 28th, he seemed to be depressed. Later there was an attack of acute indigestion from which he only partially recovered, and there was found to be a growth near the pyloric orifice of the stomach. He gradually failed, but suffered no pain, and his mind was clear up to twelve hours before the end. His sister, Mrs. Huestis, and her daughter Annie, his niece, Mrs. Strong, his nephew Ayato Johnson, and his brother John A. were with him. He left Ottawa in 1904 and came to Grand Pre to live on the old homestead and to care for his brother Dudley, who is now 69 years of age and has been harmlessly insane since he was 21. He improved the old house by building on to it a large wing for a library and a broad veranda across the whole front. Here in his fine library seated in his Morris chair, and surrounded with his books and papers, the genial, kindly doctor could be found at any time reading and writing and enjoying that quietum cum dignitate which he had so well earned. Dr. Johnson was a model citizen. He was interested in and always ready to do his part in all that concerned the welfare and improvement of the community. He was deeply interested in the school and the little children and young people. He knew them all by name and had a smile and a kind word for each. His library was free to all who would come for books, take care of them and return them, and his wonderful knowledge of an almost infinite variety of subjects was equally free to all who came to him, and was given with as exactness that was marvellous. Journalist, author, historian, scientist, theologian, nothing of interest to the human race seemed to escape his omnivorous memory. He was director of the census of 1891 and the author of a number of statistical books and pamphlets which are indispensable to public men in Canada as well as abroad. Dr. Johnson was a Canadian patriot and an imperialist of the Joseph Chamberlain type. Away back in 1860 he advocated with pen and tongue the confederation of the Provinces. He gave valuable assistance to the fathers of Confederation in the inception of the scheme and afterwards worked heroically to complete the union. He was a valued fellow-worker of all the great men, who have since confederation done the nation building and his hand and brain helped on all those great works and measures which have made this country great and prosperous and the wonder of the world. Dr. Johnson was a member of the N. S. Historical Society, an honorary member of the Royal Statistical Society, an honorary member of Canadian Manufacturers Association, and a member of the National Geographic Society. A writer in the Herald says: George Johnson was perhaps the best informed man in the Dominion of Canada. I am inclined to agree with him and would add to that, his information was the most exact. Absolute dependence could be placed on George Johnson's facts and figures. The Governors at the suggestion of Pres. Cullen, of Acadia, appointed him Lecturer on Canadian History. His lectures were to begin in February. What a loss his death just at this time has brought to Acadia College and the country. Sad and strange it seems that that wonderful brain throbbing with so much knowledge which the world needs has ceased to think and will be hidden away to-morrow in mother earth. 'What shadows we are and what shadows we pursue.' Dr. Johnson's intellectuality and the strenuous life he lived in the very thick of temptation did not lessen his faith in the bible and religion. As life ebbed and death drew near, his nice words down the 'last words.' The following passages of scripture were quoted again and again: 'If I be lifted up, I will draw all men unto me.' 'Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee because he trusted in thee.' A great man has passed away. Less than three months ago this community was rich in having two grand old men, and now both are gone. A. McN. Patterson, the 'great teacher' and Dr. George Johnson, the 'great Canadian.' The first game of the W. N. S. Hockey League to be played here, took place on Wednesday night, when Wolfville defeated the D. B. C. A. team by the score of 5-0. The Dartmouth boys played a good defence game, but, as is seen from the score, the home team far surpassed them. Wolfville did not have the same team that played Windsor. Haton, Spicer and Fraser showed up well in their rushes, and the whole team was in excellent condition. For the visitors J. Patterson figured prominently. From the start Wolfville rushed the puck into Dartmouth's territory. Fraser made a succession of rushes but could not score. After 8 minutes Spicer scored the first goal from a combination rush. Play now centred around the visitors' goal and in two minutes more Christie found the net. The puck now travelled from one end

of the ice to the other, and both goals were bombarded. Christie rushed up the ice and shot, but was blocked. Then Fraser made a rush but with no better success. J. While he was off Eaton added another to the score. Play still stayed in Dartmouth's territory. By a combination play the visitors carried the puck up the ice, but failed to score. Then followed end to end rushes, all Christie scored number seven. Dartmouth tried to get the puck out, but always lost, and just before time was up Spicer added another to the score.
