## Found 'pot' plants police charge youth

STREETSVILLE - Police have charged a 17vear-old youth on three charges under the Narcotics Control Act and one charge of possess-ing a restricted drug after they found marijuana plants growing in the youth's back-yard garden.

Streetsville Police Chief. Don Fletcher and Constables Bob Clarke and Bob Smyth found 11 plants ranging in height from two feet to four feet when they raided the youth's home on Joymar Dr.

Prior to the charges being laid. Chief Fletcher and Constable Chief Clarke had climbed a back fence, torn several leaves from the plants. and had them analyzed by the Dominion Analyst as cannabis marijuana

They then called the youth and arranged to buy some marijuana saying they were going to a party.

When they arrived at the youth's door they were met with a smile and a bag of marijuana. The youth was prompt-

### NO AXE TO GRIND

## Veterans deny descrimination

The Army, Navy and Air Force denied last week charges printed in the Aug. 12 issue of The News alleging that it is discriminatory against Italian-Canadians in renting its hall in Lakeview

"That's utterly ridiculous," Ross Gamble, treasurer for the club, said Sat-urday. "We don't have any axe to grind with any nationality.

The charges of discrimination were made by Victor DeMenna, 28 of Oakville who claims he has person-

collected evidence ally showing the hall charges more for renting the hall to Italian-Canadians than Canadians

An electrician who works in Port Credit, Mr. De-Menna said he knows of Italian-Canadians who have been charged up to \$350 to rent the hall for a day and Canadians who have been charged between \$125-150 for the same facilities.

Mr. DeMenna plans to be married at the hall on Saturday, Sept. 19 and has made a \$50 deposit.

The hall is located at 765 3rd St., Lakeview, Mississauga

In denying Mr. DeMenna's charges, Mr. Gamble added; "Our rental policies a r e very clear. We're not out cut anyone's throat.' Furthermore, he said, there are 20-30 Italian members of the Army, Navy and Air Force Veterans Club.

The matter is being investigated by the Ontario Human Rights Commission, which Mr. DeMenna claims possesses evidence further supporting his allegations.
