John, Paul and Ringo

Band On The Run — Paul McCartney (apple SO-3415) Mind Games - John Lennon (apple SW-3414) Ringo — Ringo Starr (apple SWAL-

The music on these three albums runs the gauntlet from excellent to mundane. All have their moments, good and

McCartney, with Band On The Run, is the one with the highest calibre music The album has a punch which the past few McCartney albums have sadly lacked. The opening cut, the title tune, is a standout with its meldoy changes and tasteful use of the mellotron.

Jet is reminescent of the Beatles with

the strong harmonies and general excitement of the voices and guitars. The closing cut Nineteen Hundred and Eighty Five first, heard on his special last winter, is a gem - funky and tough with great piano work by Paul. All in all it's a promising album from a great artist, who is starting to live up to all the past performances.

John Lemmon's Mind Games is a vast improvement from his Living In New York City album. However for total musical content it still lacks the magic we have come to associate with

The title tune is fantastic but the rest of the album with the possible exception of One Day (At A Time) is week. It isn't weak in the idea area, and musically it's pleasant. But it just doesn't turn me

Ringo, long thought to be the weakest

musically, comes up with an extravaganza, that while overpowering lacks any solid continuity or depth.

The musical forces here are

staggering. All the ex-Beatles appear in

one form or another. There are tunes by all of them and they all play on the album (never are all four on one track) but the songs are weak - not hits on the basis of their musical merit but hits

through past associations.

Lennon's I'm The Greatest, is the best cut of the four, and John's singing on the chorus is truly inspired. Harrison's Sunshine Life For Me makes it, due in no small way to the Band and David Bromberg.

Richard Perry's production is a always grandiose and at some points in obnoxious. With each new product. Perry seems to be striving for

that Phil Spector wall of sound.

The cut which has the most charm and class is the old tune, You're Sixteen. Ringo, never one of my favourite singers, delivers a really great vocal here and Harry Nilsoons background singing is a delight. You expect more from Lennon and McCartney with their track records.

Ringo's album, while nice, is nothing to write home about. It's to the point now, where we've

heard roughly 15 albums by the Beatles as individuals. Lennon's Imagine album the McCartney's Ram stick out in my mind as the two best. Harrison is playing his same song

over and over; Ringo is still a great drummer but he doesn't light any fires under me. Collectively they are the best but solo they indulge themselves too much. With Dylan making a comeback The Beatles, I'm sure, will be watching the reaction with interest. I for one would still like to see them do it again, together. I think it would, if nothing else, be very in

teresting. Who knows, maybe they will!

The gaps in the Watergate tapes are sounding some unexpected echoes.

For instance, new com-

ments are being heard about George Orwell's book, 1984 The book is a novel about a time when people are per-suaded by Thought Police into thinking that war is peace, ignorance is strength and it is accepted that the Ministry of Truth falsifies records when state policy changes — in fact the hero of the piece is one of the

The novel was published in 1949 — the same year the Chinese People's Republic was proclaimed in Peking; the same year the U.S. established a Department of Defense; and the year the Vatican excommunicated

The book was widely greeted as an attack on Soviet Communism, though some critics saw it as a satire, and the Catholic World wrote of Orwell: "His is a rapt concern for the plight of the human race: he directs his diatribes chiefly at Soviet Communism and English Socialims, but also, for the rest of us. living perhaps too smugly under the aegis of democracy, he sounds a liberal and rational note of warning that we examine our motives and study the meaning of our shibboleths.'

Within a year of publication, McCarthy was pounding at "the pinkos"; within the decade, Stalin was dead and Khrushchev was denouncing him as a tyrant state policy had changed and the record with it.


