A DELIGHTFUL RECITAL.

A charming musicale—sparkling with artistic brilliancy and exquisite perfection—was presented jointly, in the Oddfellows' Auditorium last evening to a cultured and delighted audience, by Miss H. Edythe Hill, mezzo-contralto, and Mr. Frank E. Blackford, assisted by Miss Flossie Bogart, pianiste; Mr. W. H. Brackin, tenor; and Miss Lillian Pratt, accompaniste.

The musical menu was an exceptionally enjoyable one, every contributor proving a veritable artist, whose efforts were most warmly acknowledged by an appreciative audience. During the presentation handsome bouquets were tendered Miss Hill and Miss Bogart.

Miss H. Edythe Hill, possesses a marvellous mezzo voice of exceptional range and admirable quality. She sings with splendid expression and charming naturalness. Her repertoire last evening was delightfully varied and demonstrated her wonderful abilities as a vocalist. From the soft cadence of the lower mezzo voice passages to the sparkling brilliancy of the forte parts Miss Hill's voice travelled with equal ease and sympathy. Her interpretations of Goring Thomas' "Summer Night" and Becker's "Springtide" were particularly effective and displayed the taste and talent of the artist. Miss Hill is a decided acquisition to the musical circles of the Maple City, and her contributions will always be enthusiastically looked for.

Mr. Frank E. Blackford, the young Toronto violinist, is a master of his instrument and his selections were executed with a perfection of technique, tone-production, expression and artistic abandon which stamp the true virtuoso. Mr. Blackford was accorded a well-deserved and hearty reception and his magnificent playing won him repeated and enthusiastic encomiums.

As a piano soloist Miss Flossie Bogart has few equals, and her renditions were exceptionally fine. Her dual number, the "Venetian Love Song" and the "March of the Dwarfs," was well chosen, and demonstrated wonderful ability and mastery of the instrument. Miss Bogart is possessed of decided talent and plays with a true conception of the subject and extraordinary technical skill.

Mr. Wm. H. Brackin never sang better. His splendid tenor voice seemed specially adapted to the successful singing of Allitsen's "Song of Thanksgiving," which was admirable. Mr. Brackin's triple number was an exquisite contribution, each selection a gem in itself and combining to make an exceedingly delightful whole.
