#### THE SHIP AT GREENWICH.

Appointment of liccoiver Causes Indig-nation in V.cinity Where This Inn Is a Cherished Landmark.

News of the appointment of a receiver by the High Court for the Ship Inn at Greenwich has caused no small amount of indignation in the locality, where this famous hostelry is a cherished landmark, says Lloyd's Weekly Newspaper. Such an event stirs the dust of history, and the old Ship has a history detling back cen-Ship has a history dating back cen Ship has a history dating back centuries. To judge by a metal token lately unearthed, the house was flourishing in 1640, and tradition has it that there was a tavern by the Thames here when Queen Elizabeth came to Greenwich. In modern times it is for its Ministerial dinners that the Ship is best known, the last being that of the Rosebery Cabinet of 1894, when the Premier missed the boat 'at Westminster, and the "Old Moores" of the party prophesied rocks ahead.

As Prince of Wales the King used

to be a frequent visitor to the Ship. He liked to go there quietly, and would drive up in a hansom with a friend and be served just as an ordimend and be served just as an ordinary customer. A chair His Majesty used is an object of interest to visitors. The late Shah of Persia liked whitebait at Greenwich even more than King Khama. The latter potentate on his last visit enjoyed four helpings of the little fish, and likewise consumed not four but s.x steaks. Of Bismarck's visit to the Ship no anecdotes are recorded. Ship no anecdotes are recorded; there are more French than German celebrities on the list, from Napoleon III, downwards. Marshal Bazaina rested here, and it was in the coffee room that Henri Rochefort was introduced to the control of the control troduced to G. A. Sala. Boulange too, came sometimes when he was in this country. Visitors of a different calibre were President Kruger and General Joubert some time after the first Boer War. After the last war came Lord Roberts and Lord Kitch-ener, General French, Sir William Catacre, and many other distinguished British officers.

The Ship suffered an irreparable loss by the destruction of its visitors book in a fire some 15 or 16 years back. As a collection of autographs the volume was unique. It contain-ed the signatures of Pitt and Fox, and every famous statesman after them, and, indeed, most men of note in the last two centuries. The Pitt and Fox Clubs dine at the house to this day. The Cobden Club dinner is a notable gathering at the Ship, and it was at one of them that Mr. it was at one of them that Mr. Chamberlain made a striking speech in support of the principle of Free Trade that is particularly remembered at the present time by the opponents of his new policy. Another club dinner of note is that of the Blue Seal Club, whose members are officers of the Guards. They dine here on a Sunday once a year, and the Duke of Cambridge takes the chair. An amusing incident occurred on one of these occasions. Among the waiters the Duke espied a colored boy, and thinking, no doubt, he ed boy, and thinking, no doubt, he was a West African importation, His Royal Highness beckoned to him to come forward, and said to him in a loud voice, "Boy, where do you come from?" With a broad grin the boy replied, "Commercial road, sir," and Sir Redvers Buller led the roar of laughter that went round the table. General Buller, by the way, also dines at the Ship with the Fox Club. The trustees of the Stock Exchange foregather annually at Greenwich, and still more famous assemblies are those of the Boyal Academics.

THE STATELY STORK.

His Immense Power on the Wins and His Lack of Voice. In Holland the nests of storks are

generally on the summit of a tall post, put up on purpose for them, on which is fixed an old cart wheel. Says an English writer: "A Dutch gentleman of my acquaintance has one such post in his grounds within sight of his li-brary window, but he improves on the cart wheel by having an iron frame-work for the reception of the nest. The first year it was put up, toward the end of June, a solitary young stork used to come daily and inspect this framework. I saw him there myself one day, standing in the empty receptacle exactly like a would be Benedict inspecting an empty house, contem-plating the view and wondering if the drains are all right. The verdict was apparently favorable, for next season saw the nest occupied by the newly wedded pair. Their pewer of wing is very fine, and on hot days I have watched them ascending spiral circles, kardly moving their broad, black wings, till they have looked no bigger than flies. After the young are hatched they appear to be suspicious of one another and unwilling to leave the nest unguarded."

Storks have no voice. The only noise they make is "klappering" (snapping their great red mandibles rapidly and loudly). Thus they greet one another, generally by throwing back the head until the upper mandible rests on the back, but occasionally "klappering" is performed with the head and bill in the former position.
