Life Lights from Lincoln

"No man knows so well where the shoe pinches as he who wears it."

"If you would win a man to your cause first convince him that you are his sincere friend."

"Understanding the spirit of our institutions to aim at the elevation of men, I am opposed to whatever tends to degrade them."

"God bless the Methodist Church, bless all the churches! And blessed be God who in this our great trial giveth us the Churches."

"You can fool all the people some of the time, and some of the people all of the time, but you cannot fool all the people all the time."

"I am nothing, but truth is everything. I know that I am right because I know that liberty is right, for Christ teaches it, and Christ is God."

"Let us make it as unfashionable to withhold our names from the temperance cause as for husbands to wear their wives' bonnets to Church, and instances will be just as rare in the one case as the other."

"Do not worry; eat three square meals a day; say your prayers; be courteous to your creditors; keep your digestion good; exercise; go slow; and go easy. Maybe there are other things that your special case requires to make you happy, but, my friend, these I reckon will give you a good lift."

"If it were not for my firm belief in an over-ruling Providence, it would be difficult for me in the midst of such complications of affairs to keep my reason in its seat. But I am confident that the Almighty has his plans and will work them out, and whether we see it or not they will be the wisest and best for us."

"I am not ashamed to confess that twenty-five years ago I was a hired laborer, mauling rails, at work on a flatboat—just what might happen to any poor man's son. I want every man to have the chance—and I believe a black man is entitled to it—in which he can better his condition—when he may look forward and hope to be a hired laborer this year and the next, work for himself afterward, and finally to hire men to work for him."

"In the very responsible position in which I happen to be placed, being a humble instrument in the hands of our Heavenly Father, as I am, and as we all are, to work out his great purposes, I have desired that all my works and acts may be according to His will, and that it might be so, I have sought His aid but if, after endeavoring to do my best in the high which He afforded, I find my efforts fail, I must believe that for some purpose, unknown to me, He wills it otherwise."

"That the Almighty does make use of human agencies and directly intervenes in human affairs is one of the plainest statements of the Bible. I have had so many evidences of his directness, so many instances when I have been controlled by some other power than my own, that I cannot doubt that this power comes from above. I frequently see my way clear to a decision when I am conscious that I have no sufficient facts upon which to found it. But I cannot recall one instance in which I have followed my own judgment, founded upon such a decision, when the results have been unsatisfactory, whereas in almost every instance where I have yielded to views of others I have had occasion to regret it. I am satisfied that when the Almighty wants me to do or not to do a particular thing he finds a way of letting me know it."—Selected.
