of April 1793—have been refpectively submitted to the King: That his Majesty having been graciously pleased to refer the whole Proceedings to his Privy Council, the result of their confustations, with His Majesty's Order thereon, was transmitted to this Government in the month of April last, and, in consequence of such order, Commissions have issued to take the whole of the property into the hands of the Crown.

After reflecting on these circumstances, should the House of Assembly continue to deem it advisable to perfiss in their proposed investigation, I shall comply with their request, to allow them access to those Papers which have already been made public, and shall in that case give orders that all perfons duly authorised by the House of Assembly, be at liberty to take Copies of all Titles, Documents, Reports, Papers, and all Proceedings under the Commission mentioned, which were returned into the Council Office, on or before the 25th of August 1790.

But, after the information I have now given, the Houfe of Affembly will certainly deem it incumbent on them to confider whether it is confiftent with that refpect which they have hitherto uniformly manifested towards their Sovereign, to reiterate any application on the subject.

On motion of Mr. Berthelot, feconded by Mr. Martineau,

ORDERED, that one hundred Copies of the Journals of this House for this Selfion, be printed in the English and French Languages, for the use of the Members of this House; under the direction of Mr. Speaker.

ORDERED, that the faid Journals be printed by fuch perfon as shall be licensed by Mr. Speaker, and that no other perfons do presume to print the same.

A Petition of certain Maitres de Poste, whose Names are thereunto fubscribed, was read by Mr. Planté in his place.

ORDERED, that the faid Petition be translated into the English Language. A Petition of John Gray, Daniel Sutherland, Thomas Schieffelin, of the City of Montreal, Merchants, Stephen Sewell of the fame place, Attorney and Advocate at Law, and Reuben Wait of the fame place, Yeoman, was presented to the House by Mr. Auldjo, and the fame was received and read.
