



My Lord, Ladies and Gentlemen :---A report of a school of this kind divides itself roughly under two heads, Work and Recreation, meaning by the latter term all the activities which are not directly connected with purely academic work. I say directly connect ed, for that these various activities have a great deal to do with education, taking that word even in its narrowest sense, no one is more thoroughconvinced than myself. I shall not attempt to adhere closely to this division throughout this report, as the two cannot always be left separate, but naturally dovetail each into the other. Regarding the work in the classics, I can say that it has been, generally speaking, consistent and good and I feel that real progress has been made by the boys.

The examinations held by the school have shown excellent results, but I should feel freer to report more fully on the matter had not the examination been conducted by ourselves. I trust we shall in the future be able to secure outside examiners for most of the forms or even to adopt a plan now practised by many schools by having an outside paid examiner to do all the work. This would contribute, I will not say a better test, but at any rate, one that would have more weight with the public generally. Regarding that part of the recreation which comes under the head of games our most conspicuous successes were in hockey, where we won most of our matches. 

MANUAL TRAINING.

The manual training department, under the able direction of the instructor, F. S. Morrison, has already clearly proved, at least in my opinion ,that this training, given primarily to the hand and eye, develops all the faculties and, instead of detracting from the academic side of education, as some claim it does, is on the contrary an actual help to this side of education. It is true that there is always a danger of a manual training department degenerating into a mere workshop where the pupils can make useful articles for themselves and their friends, but where its education value is kept well to the fore, as we are endeavoring to do here, this end of the training is seen to be the least important one. What we aim at is not so much results in the way of turning out articles of neat workmanship, but rather resuts in the way of increasing the powers of perception and giving a proper estimate of the value of system and orderliness. And lastly, but by no means least, there is the moral training which comes from the facts being impressed upon the pupil that only the very best efforts are good enough for even a trivial piece of work , and the very worst fault one can commit in the work is to attempt to hide any flaw which is due to carelessness. In this connection 1 am pleased to be able to announce that Mr. Morrison will become a member of our regular staff next term. Having Mr. Morrison with us all the time, instead of only one day in the week, will mean that we shall be able to use our equipment to more advantage.

I should also like to say a few words about the chapel. 
