QUICK VENGEANCE

This Murderer Frightened Himself to Death.

A Cowardly Crime—Struck the Head off a Sleeping Man.

Victoria B.C., Nov. 8.—A brutal murder was discovered at Saanich yesterday morning, and there is every reason to believe that the murderer was the man whose remains were found in the woods near Esquimalt several days ago, and now said to be those of one Wm. Hammond, formerly of the British navy. His victim was Henry Edmond Smith, son of Henry Smith, who keeps a grocery store at the corner of Government and John streets. The young man went out to Saanich on 20th October, and he had not since been heard from. Yesterday his father went out to visit at his cabin at Saanich. On finding the place locked up the father burst open the cabin door and found the body of his son wedged under the bunk. The bed clothes, in a heap on the floor, showed that they were hurriedly torn away by the murderer just before he swung the axe, which had almost severed young Smith's head.

HATED THE MOTIVE.
The gold watch hanging upon the nail, and the undisturbed contents of the cabin, told that robbery was not the object of the murderer, whose motive was probably hatred of the Smiths. The murderer must have sprung upon his victim as he slept.

The ranch upon which the murder was done, formerly belonged to Hammond, who was indebted to Smith, and a short time ago, an arrangement was made whereby in consideration of the liquidation of the debt and the payment of a certain sum to Hammond, the ranch reverted to Smith.

SWIFT RETRIBUTION.
Men who knew Hammond identified as his the remains found in the woods near Esquimalt a week ago. He had died from heart failure. The doctors at the coroner's jury said that while wandering through the woods he had probably been torn with fears of capture and visions of retribution, and his mental anguish had brought on the disease which killed him. Judging from the appearance of his remains the murderer died in great agony. Hammond, when found, had a flask half filled with whiskey.

THE MARKETS

LOCAL MARKET CHAT.

Planet Office, Monday evening, Nov. 7th.

Wheat.—This grain has a little easier feeling. The outlook tends towards a quiet market in the immediate future. Deliveries are fair. The mills are manufacturing heavily on recent large orders and shippers are loading a good many cars for eastern mills principally.

Oats.—An easier feeling can also be noted for oats, the market being down about one cent, a bushel from the top grade of a week or two ago. Prices are as per tabulated statement.

Barley.—Receipts and demand fair. The situation of last week prevails. Prices as per table.

Buckwheat.—Small receipts; demand fair at 35 to 40c.

Peas.—Demand to town small. The prices range from 45 to 50c for good quality. Feeding kind brings 40c.

Beans.—Fair deliveries, chiefly at outside points; market unchanged from last week.

Corn.—Fair quantity of new is offering. The market for it outside has hardly yet started. However, loads to shippers are costing 25 to 27 cents, as to quality.

Pears.—A large shipment, made by O'Keefe & Drew, leaves here today for the English market. The price is about a dollar a barrel.

Live hogs.—Fair business is doing at \$7.75 per cwt. The market is steady at present. John Duff shipped two cars today.

Shipped hogs.—A few cars have been shipped, bought at \$4.75 to \$5 per cwt. O'Keefe & Drew ship two cars Tuesday and three Wednesday. Present sales are merely fill orders for the lumber trade. Eastern packers think the market will go lower to meet the live hog market. Packers are holding off, expecting to buy cheaper.

The offerings on the market were plentiful even for a Saturday, but the downpour of rain interfered with business and many vendors had large quantities of stuff left till the afternoon.

The prices in all lines show little or no change. There is a great plenty of the best vegetables and roots. The offerings being choice keep the prices at a good margin of profit to the growers. Fruits are getting scarce. Apples and peaches are about done. The grapes have almost disappeared.

The offerings are not very choice, the fruit having been picked some time has lost a good deal of its flavor. Potatoes still hold firm at from 75 to 80 cents a bag. The market shed was crowded with offerings of butter and poultry. Poultry was present in abundance. The prices, however, remain unchanged. Butter was in fairly good demand at 18c, and the supply was good. Eggs were scarce at 15 cents, and dealers look for the price to go higher.

Pork was a good seller at 6 to 7c, a sound porker but the weather is too mild for a good market.

TORONTO PRODUCE.

Toronto, Nov. 7.—Butter. The receipts for large rolls continue quite fair. There is a good demand for all, the best offering at 13c to 15c. Dairy tub is quoted at 14c to 15c for the best and 12 to 13c for medium. Creamery is steady at 16c for prints and 18 to 16-1-2 cents for packed.

Eggs.—Are unchanged at 17c to 18c for strictly new laid, 14 to 15c for fresh-gathered and 12c for old fresh. Potatoes.—The market is steady. Cars on the track are quoted at 50c. Potatoes out of store sell at 45 to 70c.

Poultry.—The receipts are liberal and prices show a large range, owing to the quantity of poor stock offering. Quotations are 4c to 5c for turkey, 10c to 30c for ducks, 5c to 5-1-2 cents for geese, and 25c to 35c for chickens. Baled straw.—The market is dull for

Toronto, Nov. 7.—Wheat. Market weak. Chaffs easier, and Chicago lower. Red and white, north and west, offer at 68c; but exporters are holding off. Manitoba easy at 81c asked for No. 1 hard, Toronto and west, and at 78c asked for No. 1 Northern, and No. 2 hard.

Flour.—Quiet and easy owing to weakness in wheat. Straight roller, in wood north and west, offers at \$3.20 per bbl. Oatmeal.—Steady. Car lots of rolled oats, in bags, on track here, \$3.40 per bbl. and in bulk, \$3.50.

Millfeed.—Steady. Bran sells here at \$11, in ton lots, and shorts at \$16. Bran is quoted in car lots at \$9, and shorts at \$14 in ton lots. Freight, 24 loads, the bulk of which were held over.

Calves were in fair supply; moderate demand, and sold at about yesterday's prices; choice to extra, \$6.75 to \$7; good to choice, \$6 to \$6.50.

Sheep and lambs.—19 loads on sale, including five loads of Canada lambs. The trade was dull and unsatisfactory, the bulk of the best lambs sold at \$5.25, with occasional sales, a little higher.
